GETTING THE SPORT

THIS IS MODERN PENTATHLON





FENCING

The Modern Pentathlon competition starts with the Epée Fencing but in 2015 UIPM has officially introduced a new, dynamic element to the discipline. In the Ranking Round, each athlete fences against each of their rivals in bouts that last up to a minute. Just one hit is needed to win. If neither fencer has scored a hit after 60 seconds they both register a defeat. An athlete who wins 25 of their 35 bouts will get 250 pentathlon points, with each victory or defeat above or below this number worth a plus or minus score of 6 points.

In the final round, called the Bonus Round, a single fencing piste is used and the competition is a one-on-one fight, each bout lasting maximum 45 seconds. This event takes place on the same Field of Play as the Ride and Combined Event.

The pentathletes' points from the Ranking Round are taken over to the final round. The competition is carried out in reverse order, with the last-place athlete going first against the next-placed athlete. The winner of each bout will be matched against the next best-ranked pentathlete. In this way, a pentathlete may continue to advance as long as they continue to win matches. The bout winner receives one bonus point for each bout they win.

SWIMMING

The swimming event is a 200m freestyle race. The heats are seeded with the fastest swimmers competing in the final heat. A time of 2:30 is worth 250 pentathlon points and every third of a second faster or slower than this time is worth a plus or minus score of one point.



RIDING

In the riding event, athletes have to complete a show jumping course that is between 350 and 400 meters including 12 obstacles and 15 jumps, in a set time.

The horses are assigned randomly and each athlete only has 20 minutes and five practice jumps to get to know the horse in the warm-up ring, before coming out to compete.

A clear round within the time allowed is worth 300 pentathlon points.

Competitors lose 7 points for each jump they knock down, and 10 points for a refusal to jump or a fall, which is equivalent to a 10-second handicap in the final combined event. They also lose one point for each second they are over the allowed time.

It is mandatory to cross the final line otherwise the rider will be eliminated with zero points for the riding.



RUNNING & SHOOTING COMBINED

For the climax of the competition, athletes run a total distance of 3,200m, stopping to shoot and hit the target five times from 10 meters distance before each 800m leg – this is repeated four times. Athletes can start running the next 800m leg once they have hit the target five times. If they still have not hit the target five times after 50 seconds, they are allowed to continue, but any hopes of a medal will have gone.

The competitor who has amassed the most points in the first three events starts the combined event first, with the rest of the field facing a one second handicap for each pentathlon point by which they trail the leader. This ensures that the first person to cross the finish line wins the Gold medal.

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MEDIA & TV COVERAGE

TV & LIVE STREAMING

Throughout 2016, all Modern Pentathlon competition finals will be live-streamed in programme style, lasting around one hour.

The live stream will consist of 2 main elements - a highlights package of the day's first 3 disciplines (Swimming, Fencing and Riding) followed by live coverage of the closing Combined event.

In tandem with its partnership with production company Sunset+Vine, UIPM recently launched UIPMTV.org. On this dedicated platform, not only can Modern Pentathlon fans enjoy a high-quality live streaming experience - UIPM TV goes a step further and lets viewers have fun while they watch the event by engaging with Facebook and Twitter.

UIPMTV.org tracks thousand of verified social media accounts from international federations, athletes, coaches, journalists and fans.

NEWS EDITS

On the night of each final event, four minutes of news edits are digitally available. These edits include interviews and footage from the day's action. Specific interviews and footage of certain athletes can be arranged on request.

POST-EVENT HIGHLIGHTS

The official one-hour highlights programme will focus on the Men's and Women's events, and may also include coverage from the Mixed Relay and other key moments from the competition week. The highlights programme is delivered in digital material with International soundtrack and full English commentary and script. It will be available ten days after each event.

WORLD RECORDS

UIPM 2015 WORLD CUP #1

One of the highlights of the UIPM 2015 World Cup #1 was Logan Storie's new Modern Pentathlon world record in the Swimming event (50m loog).

Storie (USA) swam the 200m in 1:53.72min, a performance that took more than one second off the previous record (1:54.25min) held by Britain's James Cooke.

UIPM 2015 WORLD CUP #2

International Day of Happiness on March 20 was particularly sweet for two of Modern Pentathlon's finest marksmen as the shooting world record was broken twice.

It was during qualification for the Men's Individual Final at World Cup #2 in Cairo. Egypt, that William Muinhos (BRA) scored five hits in 7.01 seconds. Amazingly, only a few minutes later Marvin Doque (GER) demolished the new record by managing five shots in just 5.9 seconds.

SENIOR WORLD CHAMPIONSHIP

Logan Storie (USA) swam the 200m in 1:53.08 to break his own world record of 1:53.72 during the Men's Individual Qualification.

Lena Schoneborn (GER) made a disappointing start to the day finishing 28th in the Swimming, but recovered well and went on to finish first in the Fencing beating the World Record with 280 Points (30 victories and 5 defeats), sixth in the Riding and stretch a nine second advantage going in the Combined Event.

2015 REVIEW

THE HIGHLIGHTS

WHAT A SEASON, WHAT A YEAR!

The 2015 elite UIPM scene featured Olympic qualifying competitions on four continents, a World Cup series and a World Championships. Each of them challenged the best male and female pentathletes in the world to outdo one another, every competitor knowing that the sport's highest podium is now within sight, looming on the horizon.

One pentathlete stood out in 2015 for consistent success: Laura Asadauskaite of Lithuania. Having already won two World Cups she claimed gold at the World Cup Final in Minsk (BLR) and followed up in August with the European title in Bath (GBR).

The only major prize that eluded her was the World Championship gold, which was claimed by Lena Schoneborn of Germany.

On the men's side, it was a far more open scene albeit one dominated by the Europeans. The world title went to Ukraine as Pavlo Tymoshchenko fought off the challenge of reigning champion Aleksandr Lesun (RUS). Ireland enjoyed its first-ever major international title success as Arthur Lanigan-O'Keeffe won the European title, and it was an Italian, Riccardo de Luca, who prevailed at the UIPM World Cup Final.

As we enter 2016, the action will quickly accelerate towards Rio as World Cup #2 takes place as a test event in the Olympic Games host city. Many of the 72 Olympic places remain up for grabs as national rivals do battle for the right to represent their country.

The stakes have never been higher. The sport has never been so strong. It's time to grasp the ultimate prize.

PENTATHLON WORLD RANKING

HOW DOES IT WORK?

The PWR is the official list used to rank pentathletes. It includes the ranking points awarded to the pentathletes according to their three best placing in the official UIPM international competitions held during the preceding 12 months. If during this 12-month period there are 2 competitions of the same type (example: 2 CCh, 2 WCh, 2 WCF) only the most recent will be included in the PWR.

There are PWR individual lists for Senior, Junior and Youth, for both genders and Relays.

Every pentathlete earns PWR Points according to the level of the competition and his/her final place as specified in the PWR Point Table.

WHICH LEVEL OF COMPETITIONS EXIST?

There are four (4) level of competitions.

Level 1:

Olympic Games, World Championships, World Cup Final. The winner gets 80 points. Following places earn points according to points table

• Level 2:

Continental Championships/ Games, World Cup Competitions, CISM World Championships. The winner gets 60 points

Level 3 and 4:

Regional Championships/Games and International World Ranking Competitions, depending on participation and strength they will be ranked as level 3 or 4 competitions. The winner gets 40 or 20 points, according to the level.

MODERNPENTATHLON

Modern Pentathlon is a unique multi-discipline sport created by the Olympic Games founder, Baron Pierre de Coubertin, that combines mental and physical challenge to find the most complete athlete. It evolved out of the Ancient Pentathlon at the 1912 Stockholm Olympics.



It was Baron Pierre De Coubertin's belief that the Modern Pentathlon event would "test a man's moral qualities as much as his physical resources and skills, producing thereby the ideal, complete athlete".

Pentathlon has evolved considerably over the years. It adopts modern concepts and latest technology to improve the competition and the spectator and fan experience.

MODERN PENTATHLON COMPETITIONS FORMULA

UIPM WORLD CHAMPIONSHIPS

World Championships take place annually for senior (22 and over), junior (19-21 years) and youth A (17-18 years) athletes, men and women, which include individual, team and relay events. Youth A World Championships differ slightly in that they do not include riding.

Athletes qualify for the Final via qualification groups of up to 36 athletes per group. So, in the case of 3 groups, the top 8 placed athletes qualify directly from each group, with the next best 12 athletes from all groups rounding out the field. The athletes then compete in the Finals, which is therefore comprised of the best 36 competitors from these qualifiers. Individual medals are awarded as well as team medals, which are decided by adding the three individual team members' scores together. For the exciting relay event, this consists of up to 24 teams of two athletes, competing in a continuous relay using all five disciplines and is completed in just one day. Each team member swims 100m, fences one opposing team member, rides a horse over 9 x obstacles and finishes the competition with the combined event, consisting of 2 series of shooting and 2 x 1 km running. In this way, the relay competition is an exciting spectacle requiring contribution from both team members in every event. Also a mixed relay with two competitors, one man and one woman, has been included since 2009 on the official World Championships programme.

UIPM WORLD CUP SERIES

A World Cup Series for both Men and Women has been organized since 1990. Each year between 4 and 6 World Cup competitions and a World Cup Final are organized and the whole package is called the World Cup Series. The best 36 athletes qualify for the World Cup Final via a ranking list using the three best results of each athlete at World Cup competitions. The very best 36 athletes are guaranteed to compete in the Finals. Significant Prize money is also available.

BIATHLE (SWIM-RUN)

Biathle was established in Monaco in 1999. Through Biathle the UIPM has established a competition comprising of two fundamental components of Modern Pentathlon and represent the most practised sports in the world – running and swimming.



The Biathle competition begins with a pack start of runners who complete one-half of the total running distance before entering a 50 meter transition area. Athletes then dive into the water and swim the required swimming distance before exiting the water, putting on their shoes and running the second leg of the run to the finish line.

TRIATHLE (SHOOT-SWIM-RUN)

Through Triathle, the UIPM has established a platform to encourage young athletes to practise modern pentathlon starting from the basic disciplines of running and swimming and then progressing into shooting to slowly become full pentathletes.



Modern Triathle begins normally with a pack start of runners for the first 25m, followed by athletes competing in the first of multiple shooting series of 5 shots each, prior to approaching the transition area and then swimming before running the final leg to the finish line. It was introduced in 2012.

TETRATHLON (FENCING-SWIM-RUN-SHOOT)

It is, to all intents and purposes, Modern Pentathlon without the horses. Tetrathlon has become a vital part of the UIPM portfolio because it combines Fencing, Swimming and the Combined Event and is therefore the perfect audition for our ultimate five-sport test.



Tetrathlon is now the favoured format for many important events including the Youth Olympic Games (Singapore 2010 and Nanjing 2014), University-level competitions and the Masters (over-30s) circuit. It is also used for Youth A (under 19) and Youth B (under 17) competitions, allowing teenage athletes to qualify for the YOG.

LASER-RUN (SHOOT-RUN)

Laser-Run is the new and exciting UIPM initiative launched in the middle of 2014 to increase international interest in developing additional disciplines to broaden our presence worldwide; enabling all athletes in the world to overcome difficulties in terms of access to new technologies, systems and equipment which might be a barrier of entry into the world of sport.



Laser-Run consists of running and shooting, which has been tested in all varieties of weather conditions and on diverse surfaces to include the cross-country environment, track and field as well as indoor arenas. Its 'plug and play' approach, easy to set up, combined with the uniqueness of the concept has facilitated its rapid growth for the last 10 months.

WORLD SCHOOLS BIATHLON (SWIM-RUN)

In 2005 UIPM launched a new competition linked to the success of Biathle. The event consists of the swimming and running disciplines. The swimming discipline is conducted in a 25m or 50m pool and the running discipline is conducted preferably on a standardized track (although it can also be carried out on a flat surface if extra care is taken so that the distances are correct).



The swimming discipline is conducted first and the running discipline is by mass start. The Final result is the sum of the total swimming and running points.

The success and originality of the 'World Schools Biathle' is that schools take part in this international competition by entering their results in a global database using the UIPM website (www.pentathlon.org) directly from their location.









UNIVERSITIES

UIPM and FISU: A Connection With a Bright Future

The year of 2015 was a milestone regarding the inclusion of Modern Pentathlon within the international university sports movement.

The capital city of the state of Morelos, Cuernavaca, in Mexico, welcomed 32 athletes representing 6 countries and from 20 higher education institutions at the International University Open, the first Modern Pentathlon event affiliated to FISU.

For 2016 and 2017 promoting our sport together with FISU at the university level worldwide as well as hosting bigger international university events are important steps leading up to the first World University Championships in Modern Pentathlon in 2018.

Modern Pentathlon is often considered the most complete sport, and with over 100 years of history, the UIPM has the legitimacy to promote its values and culture, in particular to the younger generations under the motto of "Education through Modern Pentathlon". This approach matches that of FISU and further highlights the existing proximity and consequent synergy between both organizations.

Keeping this in mind, the UIPM has drafted a detailed strategic plan, specifically oriented to University Sports, which is currently being implemented in partnership with its member national federations. This plan envisions to actively promote and help implement Modern Pentathlon, and its sub-sport programmes, at universities worldwide, sharing the UIPM's know-how and technologies with key people on site.

Other actions planned include informational material presenting the sport for FISU member associations, and educational material on sport and especially the combined event for interested universities and their students/athletes.



MASTERS

First and foremost, after a successful initial trial and implementation of laser shooting in 2014, thanks to the support given by UIPM in terms of technology and equipment, 2015 has seen the introduction of official laser shooting all the year round.

Six official events were held by the Masters movement by the end of 2015. Starting with the traditional Winter Pentathlon held in Davos (SUI), the Masters progressed into a regular season with two additional competitions - the Springlehrgang Opens followed by the usual Show Jumping Masters Workshop set in Saale (GER).

This offered the opportunity to some more Masters to join in during the season

while participating in two more additional opens such as the International Open German Masters, in Halle (GER), and the Baron Pierre de Coubertin Dutch Open Masters Championships, in Arnhem (NED).

The season then culminated with the 2015 Open European Masters Championships held in Gyor (HUN) that showcased the best of Modern Pentathlon Masters with the presence of more than 20 nations, 78 athletes competing in both gender individual events as well as mixed relays. It also offered the chance of including new nations such as Monaco and the Netherlands which had no Masters movement for quite a while, to name just a few.

PARA-PENTATHLON

Following membership granted by the International Paralympic Committee to the movement in 2014, the UIPM has moved steps forward in the development of Para-Pentathlon while setting new milestones for 2016.

More than 200 hours of research and studies were conducted in order to understand classification structure and streamline future steps. This culminated in the first official test event hosted in the city of Buenos Aires (ARG) combined with the UIPM Youth A World Championships in September, 2015. Four out of five disciplines were tested, including both Wheelchair Fencing (set up at the bonus

round mode - unique in its genre) and Para-Combined.

The implementation of this first testing phase was the Para-Pentathlon pinnacle for 2015. UIPM representatives will keep attending meetings with the main IPC members and stakeholders using some of those lessons learnt for future reference and upcoming testing, that will be also set up for the 2016 season.

The Para-Pentathlon Framework Plan aims the inclusion of Para-Pentathlon within the official programme for the Paralympic Games starting in 2024.













THE 67TH UIP MCONGRESS

A New and Modern Governance for UIPM



The 67th UIPM Congress in 2015 has approved a number of motions designed to modernize the way the UIPM manages Modern Pentathlon and its sub-sports, including:

HIGHLIGHTS. HEROES & RECORDS

1950s



Men: This was a decade dominated by Swedish athletes, with several World Championships titles and two consecutive Olympic Gold medals for Lars Hall in 1952 and 1956. Lars Hall was the first Pentathlete to win individual Olympic and World Championships Gold. But all the time the athletes from Soviet Union Konstantin Salnikov and especially Igor Novikov were starting to get stronger...

1960s



Men: Former Soviet Union (URSS) and Hungary were the dominant nations, winning all team gold medals at Olympic Games and World Championships, Igor Novikov, and then especially Andras Balczo (winning individual Olympic and several individual World Championships Gold) from Hungary were the outstanding athletes, with Ferenc Török and Ferenc Nemeth winning Olympic Gold as well.

1970s



Men: After Andras Balczo was crowned as Olympic Champion in 1972, he was succeeded by Janusz Peciak from Poland in 1976. He became the best athlete of this era, together with Pavel Ledney, 4 times individual World Championships from the URSS. Poland was the only nation to break the URSS and Hungarian phalanx, by clinching several World Championships team titles. The only other athlete winning individual Gold at World Championships during this time was Bob Nieman from USA in 1979.

1980s



Men: Whereas Poland (with Peciak and his teammates). Soviet Union (with Anatoli Starostin, World Championships and Olympic Champion) and Hungary (with a new, young team) kept winning, Italy become a strong nation, winning team gold in 1986, Olympic medals and individual World Championships titles with Daniele Masala and Carlo Massullo. By the end of the decade, all of the new Hungarian team comprised of Attila Mizser, Laszlo Fabian and Janos Martinek had won individual gold at either World Championships or Olympic Games and several team gold medals. Starostin, Peciak and Masala all won individual Olympic Gold and individual World Championships Gold.



Women: In the early years of women's Modern Pentathlon the athletes from Poland and Soviet Union dominated: Irina Kiseleva (URSS) and Barbara Kotowska and Dorota Idzi (Poland). But besides those the German athlete Sabine Krapf, Danish athlete Eva Fjellerup and the French team started to win medals at World Championships.

1990s



Men: Poland had strong individual athletes with Arkadiusz Skrzypaszek, winning individual Gold at the Olympics (1992) and World Championships 1991. Besides Hungary, Poland and URS being strong teams the French became a strong Pentathlon nation. It started with Joel Bouzou winning individual World Championships Gold in 1987, team Gold at World Championships 1994 and finally Sebastien Deleigne winning consecutive individual Gold at World Championships 1997 and 1998. The Russian athlete Dimitry Svatkovsky also won consecutive individual World Championships Gold in 1994 and 1995.



Women: Whereas Poland remained the dominant team and Italy was an emerging force, Eva Fjellerup from Denmark was the woman to catch as she won individual World Championships Gold 4 times. Hungary, Germany, Italy and Russia, Belarus had very successful women athletes during this time as well.

2000s



Men: Dimitry Svatkovsky completed his medal collection by also winning individual Olympic Gold in 2000 and leading a new Russian generation to several World Championships titles. Andrey Moiseev became double Olympic champion (2004 and 2008). Besides established nations, new countries, such as Lithuania (Andrejus Zadneprovskis, Edvinas Krungolcas), Czech Rep (Michal Sedlecky) and also Germany (Eric Walther) had athletes winning World Championships and also Olympic medals. It was also the decade when Asian countries, led by South Korea and China, started to become strong contenders, especially with Zhenhua Qian winning individual World Championships Gold in 2005.



Women: Great Britain started to become a very strong team, winning team and individual Gold medals at World Championships; but also winning Gold and Bronze at the first Olympic Games to feature women's Pentathlon in 2000. Zsuzsanna Vörös from Hungary and Stephanie Cook (GBR) both won individual Gold at World Championships and Olympic Gold and Silver respectively. Amélie Caze from France and Lena Schoeneborn from Germany became the next athletes to wear the crown, Caze winning World Championships three times and Schoeneborn taking home Olympic Gold in 2008.

2010s



Men: The Russian athletes were still winning lots of medals, but David Svoboda emerged to take the Gold medal to the Czech Republic for the first time. Adam Marosi added to his individual World Championships title 2009 with an Olympic Bronze medal in 2012.

Women: Laura Asadauskaite from Lithuania and Lena Schoneborn both made history by adding individual World Championships and Olympic Gold to their multiple medals won in other competitions.

THE ROAD TO RIO 2016

We are the History of the Games

Olympic Pentathlon was introduced for the first time at the 18th Ancient Olympiad around 708 BC with the disciplines long jump, javelin, discus throw, stadion (short foot race) and wrestling. Due to the strong physical skills required to be a pentathlete, the sport was from the outset closely associated with military service.

Pentathlon held such paramount importance in the Ancient Games that champions were honored as victor ludorum, which is Latin for "winner of the games". In the modern era, at the 12th IOC Session in Berlin in 1909, different types of Modern Pentathlon started to be discussed with the aim of reprising the discipline in the Olympic Games. The discussion was initiated by Baron Pierre de Coubertin, founder of the Modern Olympic Games.

Nevertheless, in Coubertin's own words, the proposal "had always been greeted with a lack of understanding and almost hostility". Only two years later, in 1911, at the 14th IOC Session, Modern Pentathlon was fully endorsed as an indispensable sport and then included in the programme of the 1912 Olympics

endorsed as an indispensable sport and then included in the programme of the 1912 Olympics in Stockholm, Sweden. It was decided that Modern

Pentathlon would comprise riding, fencing, shooting, swimming and running. Surprisingly, Pierre de Coubertin would have preferred rowing to be included instead of shooting, but he recognized it would increase the complexity of Modern Pentathlon as the ultimate sporting challenge.

Modern Pentathlon was administered directly by the IOC until 1948, when the Union Internationale de Pentathlon Moderne was founded by the nations who participated at the London Olympic Games and where Gustaf Dyrssen became the first President. In 1954, UIPM started to develop the sport of Biathlon through its athletes from the military and Biathlon was introduced for the first time at the 1960 Winter Olympic Games, Squaw Valley. Subsequently, in 1968, the UIPM Congress extended its name to the Union Internationale de Pentathlon Moderne et Biathlon (UIPMB).

On July 3rd 1993, in London, the two pillars of UIPMB decided to act as separate self-governing International Federations (UIPM and International Biathlon Union-IBU). UIPM had already been a full member of the IOC since 1948 and on August 20th 1998, the IOC decided to accept IBU as a full independent winter-sport federation.

The Modern Pentathlon has been on the Olympic programme continuously since 1912 and marked its 100-year anniversary at the London 2012 Olympic Games.

From Stockholm 1912 to Moscow 1980, the competition was held over five days with one event per day. This decreased to four days between Los Angeles 1984 and Barcelona 1992. Finally, at the 1996 Atlanta Olympic Games, Modern Pentathlon settled on a one-day event format. On January 30 1998, at the IOC Session in Nagano, the UIPM received approval for women to compete from Sydney 2000 onwards.

In February 2013 in Lausanne, the IOC decided to enshrine Modern Pentathlon as one of the 25 core sports of the Summer Olympics. For the Rio 2016 Olympic Games, Modern Pentathlon aims to surpass its successes of previous editions and as at Athens, Beijing and London a 100% ticket sell-out is guaranteed.

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
