UIPM PRESIDENT'S WELCOME

**Dear Media Representatives,
Dear UIPM Family,**

We embark on the 2024 season, Olympic year, with a surge of momentum and a clear sense of purpose knowing that our sport is once again secure in the Olympic movement!

I write this welcome note three months after the 141st Session of the International Olympic Committee in Mumbai (IND) made its historic decision to confirm Modern Pentathlon's place on the programme of the Los Angeles 2028 Olympic Games.

At this point I must mention the fantastic team effort that delivered this result. Together we rose to the challenge of proving that our sport belongs not only in the history of the Olympic Games, but in its future. And within the UIPM family we are determined to take a lead role in delivering the IOC's important reforms.

In August in Paris, the world will see a beautiful picture of Modern Pentathlon in its current form, including the 90-minute showcase of all five disciplines that has proved so effective and popular since its introduction in 2023.

At the Palace of Versailles, the introduction of semi-finals will add extra competitive intrigue to our Olympic event, reducing the number of finalists to 18 women and 18 men. An additional day of competition will help us to reach more viewers and spectators with our historic and compelling multi-sport – a sport which never stands still.

This will be the first Summer Olympics built around the reforms of Olympic Agenda 2020+5. In Sydney 2000, Modern Pentathlon achieved gender equality and now the entire Games will become equally female and male in terms of participating athletes. The centenary Games in Paris will also send a strong message about sustainability.

In the birthplace of Baron Pierre de Coubertin, founder of the Modern Olympic Games and Modern Pentathlon, we will be reminded of everything that makes the Olympic movement uniquely powerful. While our world continues to be shaken by war and political tension, sport will again shine as a beacon for respect and fairness, education and peace.

Turning to our own 2024 calendar, it will be a fascinating year with Olympic qualification still the main focus for many of our elite athletes and a Pentathlon World Cup series in Egypt, Türkiye, Hungary and Bulgaria followed by our long-awaited return to China for the showpiece UIPM 2024 Pentathlon and Laser Run World Championships in Zhengzhou.

At the same time, we are managing a profound and essential transformation within our sport.

In 2023, Obstacle was integrated into Modern Pentathlon during the UIPM U17, U19 and Junior World Championships, and in many national and continental events. Already we saw the increased accessibility of Modern Pentathlon at grassroots level and the potential of this transition to change the game for current and

future audiences. Even the journalists who tried the Obstacle course loved it!

We understand that the end of an era is difficult for many athletes, coaches, judges, organisers and fans of our historic sport. Horses have been a feature of Modern Pentathlon from the start, in 1912. But it was clearly stated by the IOC President in Mumbai that if we had not changed, we would have been changed.

In other words, Modern Pentathlon would now be heading for the Olympic Museum. Instead, we are heading for LA28 – another Games that gives us a chance to redefine what the Olympics means for new generations of fans and athletes.

With Obstacle now an integral part of our movement, we have fans and participants in every corner of the world, making Modern Pentathlon easier to access for so many people who could only dream until now of becoming Olympians. On the governance side, the integration of FISO into UIPM will also make our global community stronger.

I hope you enjoy the 2024 season and the unique combination of excitement and joy, solidarity and hope for the future that sport brings to our lives.

Live coverage is available on UIPM TV of all Semi-finals, Finals and Mixed Relays in the UIPM Pentathlon World Cups, World Cup Finals and World Championships (senior).

A new and improved 30-minute highlights package will be provided in

2024 as we follow the 'road to Paris' with selected athletes aiming to qualify for the Paris 2024 Olympic Games. There will be a longer 60-minute highlights package for the UIPM 2024 Pentathlon World Cup Final in Ankara (TUR) and UIPM 2024 Pentathlon World Championships in Zhengzhou (CHN).

At the end of all Category A Pentathlon competition finals, a video news report (VNR) is delivered. This package includes interviews and footage from the day's action. Specific interviews and footage of certain athletes can be arranged on request. Media can submit their interest to media@pentathlon.org.

2024 PARIS OLYMPICS

With the Paris 2024 Olympic Games looming ever nearer on the horizon, many of the world's leading pentathletes will be striving throughout the 2024 UIPM season for the performances they need to secure qualification.

With 46 quota places allocated so far, and 72 in total up for grabs, there are still several ways for the world's most versatile athletes to reach the coveted destination of Chateau de Versailles where the Olympic Modern Pentathlon will be staged from August 8-11.

It promises to be an epic edition of the Olympics, 100 years since the last Games in Paris - the birthplace of Baron Pierre de Coubertin – and the last Modern Pentathlon to feature equestrian.

Six automatic places (three each for women and men) will be on offer during the seasonal showpiece – the UIPM 2024 Pentathlon World Championships – taking place in Zhengzhou (CHN) from June 9-16. France, as Olympic host nation, will be guaranteed at least one place per

gender, and there will be two Universality places per gender will be reserved for NOCs that applied via the Tripartite Commission before the deadline of 15 January, 2024.

At present that leaves 14 places to be earned by right, and this will be where the key battleground takes place in 2024. The UIPM Olympic World Ranking List will be closely monitored throughout the elite season as athletes vie for position, hoping to secure one of the available places for female and male athletes when the final list is published on 17 June.

Ranking points will be available at all stages of the UIPM 2024 Pentathlon World Cup. In June 2024, the process of selection will be formalised as NOCs and National Federations are officially informed of the number of quota places they have earned, with the option of handing any or all of them back, leading to a reallocation according to the ranking list.





2023 IN REVIEW

The year 2023 saw Modern Pentathlon's exciting new competition format become strongly embedded, creating the perfect platform for athletes to compete for Paris 2024 Olympic qualification places.

The 90-minute showcase and elimination structure created a truly compelling experience for spectators and viewers, leading to a series of gripping encounters on UIPM's global competition circuit – with leading contenders for the next Olympic gold medals emerging and new talents coming to the fore.

UIPM 2023 PENTATHLON WORLD CUP

MARCH 6-12

CAIRO (EGY)

Michelle Gulyas (HUN) and **Ahmed Elgendy** (EGY) both came from behind to start the season with superb individual victories.

World No.1 Gulyas (HUN) took control as she overturned the lead of **Elodie Clouvel** (FRA) to win the Women's Final. Clouvel (FRA) fought hard to hold on to silver ahead of **Salma Abdelmaksoud** (EGY), who claimed her second consecutive bronze in the season-opener.

Tokyo 2020 Olympic silver medallist Elgendy (EGY) started the Laser Run almost half a minute off the lead but managed his race perfectly to win the Men's Final ahead of silver medallist **Csaba Bohm** (HUN) and **Martin Vlach** (CZE), who made up five places to claim bronze.

Gintare Venckauskaite and **Titas Puronas** dug deep and served up an exhibition of sharp shooting to take Mixed Relay gold for Lithuania, clawing back a 25-second deficit in the Laser Run to take top honours. **Mexico** claimed a deserved silver with **Korea** clinching bronze.

APRIL 10-16

ANKARA (TUR)

Ieva Serapinaite (LTU) and **Mohanad Shaban** (EGY) showed the value of consistency to take home the big prizes at UIPM 2023 Pentathlon World Cup Ankara.

Serapinaite (LTU) started the Women's Final Laser Run behind two French athletes but seized her opportunity when they malfunctioned on the shooting range. Serapinaite (LTU) held off a fierce challenge from two first-time medallists, **Rebecca Langrehr** (GER) taking silver ahead of **Mariana Arceo** (MEX) who settled for bronze.

The drama continued as men's Olympic champion Joseph Choong (GBR) suffered elimination in Riding. His fellow Tokyo 2020 medallists capitalised, with **Woongtae Jun** (KOR) cruising to silver and **Ahmed Elgendy** (EGY) winning bronze to join victorious team-mate Shaban (EGY) on the podium.

Ilke Ozyuksel and **Bugra Unal** delivered Mixed Relay glory for host nation Türkiye, leading from the front in the Laser Run ahead of **Mexico** and **Great Britain**.

APRIL 24-30

BUDAPEST (HUN)

The headline stars were individual gold medallists **Blanka Guzi** (HUN) and **Woongtae Jun** (KOR), but there were an incredible six world record performances as athletes scorched the Laser Run course.

Gintare Venckauskaite (LTU) set a new mark of 10min 58.20sec, narrowly edging team-mate **Laura Asadauskaite** (LTU) into the record books. Guzi (HUN) also went under that time in her epic comeback to win gold ahead of team-mate **Michelle Gulyas** (HUN) and **Salma Abdelmaksoud** (EGY).

Men's bronze medallist **Martin Vlach** (CZE) lost his world record to **Andras Gall** (HUN) during Qualification but reclaimed it in the Final as he joined champion Jun (KOR) and silver medallist **Mohanad Shaban** (EGY) on the podium.

Sunwoo Kim and **Changwan Seo** triumphed in the Mixed Relay for Korea ahead of **Mexico** and **France**.

MAY 8-15

SOFIA (BUL)

First-time winner **Kerenza Bryson** (GBR) and the more experienced **Valentin Prades** (FRA) took home gold from the Bulgarian capital. Bryson (GBR) held off a spirited attack from first-time medallist **Seungmin Seong** (KOR), with **Ieva Serapinaite** (LTU) claiming another podium place with bronze.

Prades (FRA) then claimed his first gold medal since the UIPM 2021 Pentathlon World Cup Final. **Taishu Sato** (JPN) was overjoyed with his silver medal while **Marvin Dogue** (GER) celebrated his first individual podium since 2019.

A day later Bryson added another gold as she teamed up with **Charles Brown** for a dominant Mixed Relay gold for **Great Britain**. Silver again

went to **Mexico** with **France** securing another bronze.

MAY 30 - JUNE 4

PENTATHLON WORLD CUP FINAL

The first tickets to Paris 2024 were punched in the most dramatic circumstances as **Elena Micheli** (ITA) and **Mohanad Shaban** (EGY) raced to glory and Olympic qualification in Ankara (TUR).

Micheli (ITA) won a thrilling Women's Final after holding off the challenge of local favourite **Ilke Ozyuksel** (TUR), who delighted the home crowd with silver, and bronze medallist **Marie Oteiza** (FRA).

The Men's Final almost had to be abandoned due to heavy rain, but it finally took place after a three-hour rain delay and Shaban (EGY) overcame a slip to defeat Tokyo 2020 Olympic champion **Joseph Choong** (GBR) to silver in an astonishing sprint finish. **Emiliano Hernandez** (MEX) held off pressure from **Csaba Bohm** (HUN) to secure bronze.

Sunwoo Kim and **Woongtae Jun** of **Korea** turned on the style to win Mixed Relay gold. **France** celebrated silver while Hungary completed a huge comeback for **bronze**.

AUGUST 20-29

PENTATHLON WORLD CHAMPIONSHIPS

Egypt and its golden generation of pentathletes topped the medal table at the annual showpiece competition in Bath (GBR).

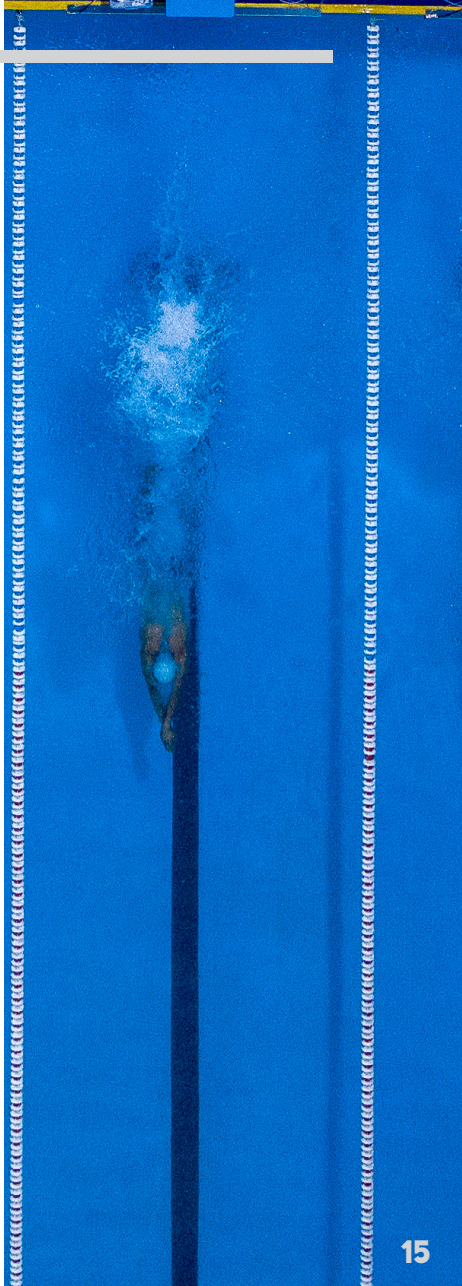
Individual honours went to two of the sport's biggest stars as **Elena Micheli** (ITA) and **Joseph Choong** (GBR) underlined their brilliance by claiming back-to-back world titles.

Egypt dominated the Relay and Team events with gold in the Mixed Relay and three other gold medals, **Mohanad Shaban** (EGY) completing his own personal haul of two golds and a bronze.

There was joy for the host nation as **Kerenza Bryson** (GBR) proved to be the only women's competitor to qualify for Paris while on the men's side, **Emiliano Hernandez** (MEX) grabbed a place.

Micheli (ITA) was also joined on the podium by **Alice Sotero** (ITA) while Choong (GBR) had Hernandez (MEX) and Shaban (EGY) for company after an intriguing battle.

Shaban (EGY) teamed up with **Salma Abdelmaksoud** for a dominant Mixed Relay gold for **Egypt**, with **Korea** and **Czech Republic** claiming silver and bronze respectively.



JULY 10-16

U17 PENTATHLON WORLD CHAMPIONSHIPS

Athletes from 26 nations took part in the first global youth competition to feature a five-discipline Pentathlon in Alexandria (EGY).

Farida Khalil (EGY) made history as the first Youth athlete to become individual world champion in a full Modern Pentathlon, with **Nadja Farmand** (GER) and **Annachiara Allara** (ITA) claiming silver and bronze respectively.

An incredibly dramatic Men's Final saw **Mathis Issaka Idelarge** (FRA) win a four-way sprint to become world champion ahead of silver medallist **Bartosz Szmytko** (POL) and **Tarek Sadek** (EGY).

The Women's and Men's Relays went to **Germany** and **Egypt** respectively, before **Great Britain** finished on a high with Mixed Relay gold.

JULY 24-30

U19 PENTATHLON WORLD CHAMPIONSHIPS

A week of thrilling competition in Istanbul (TUR) saw further evidence of strong talent production lines in Egypt and France.

Malak Ismail (EGY) claimed women's gold with a superb all-round performance ahead of **Sumin Shin** (KOR) and **Zora Zeman** (HUN).

Etienne Clergeau (FRA) dug deep to triumphed in an energy-sapping Laser Run with Hungary toasting a medal double thanks to **Botond Tamas** (silver) and **Zalan Jasso** (bronze).

A thrilling Women's Relay was won by **Switzerland** while **Korea** returned to the top of the podium with an impressive Men's Relay gold and **France** ended strongly by clinching the Mixed Relay.

SEPTEMBER 11-17

JUNIOR PENTATHLON WORLD CHAMPIONSHIPS

Egypt claimed three gold medals in another strong team performance in Druskininkai (LTU), but it was **France** who topped the medal table with **Germany** in third.

Josefine Unterberger (GER) and **Mathis Rochat** (FRA) broke new ground as the first world junior champions in the new-look Modern Pentathlon with Obstacle integrated. Unterberger (GER) kicked in the final 300m of the Women's Final Laser Run to overtake **Katarzyna Debska** (POL), with **Louison Cazaly** (FRA) in third.

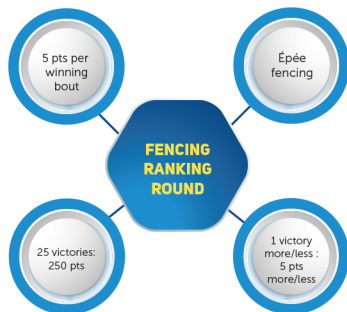
Rochat (FRA) dominated the Men's Final having started Laser Run 3rd, and his team-mate **Leo Bories** (FRA) fought hard for bronze behind local hero **Paulius Vagnorius** (LTU).

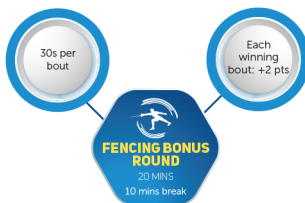
Teenage starlets **Malak Ismail** and **Farida Khalil** proved unassailable for **Egypt** in the Women's Relay. Having already won the Men's Relay, **Mathis Rochat** took his personal gold-medal tally to three as **France** added the Men's Team gold before Egypt closed out with Mixed Relay success.

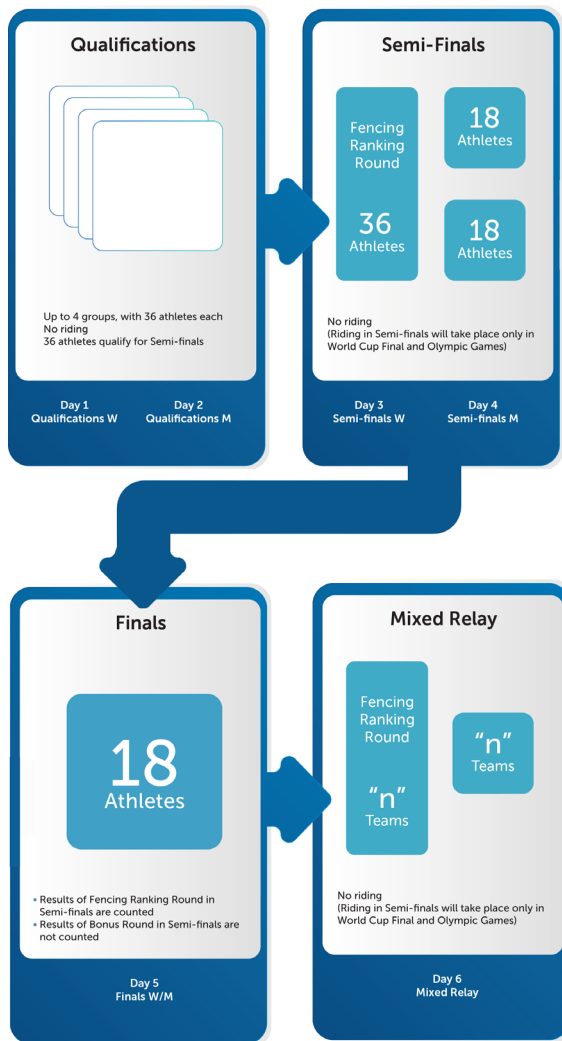

HOW DOES IT WORK?

The PWR is the official list used to rank pentathletes. It includes the ranking points awarded to the pentathletes according to their three best placing in the official UIPM international competitions held during the preceding 12 months.

If during this 12-month period there are two competitions of the same type only the most recent will be included in the PWR.

There are PWR individual lists for Senior, Junior and Youth, for both genders and Relays.

Every pentathlete earns PWR points according to the level of the competition and his/her final place as specified in the PWR Point Table.

WHICH LEVEL OF COMPETITIONS EXIST?

There are four levels of competition.

Level 1:

Olympic Games, Pentathlon World Championships, Pentathlon World Cup Final. The winner gets 80 points. Following places earn points according to points table.

Level 2:

Continental Championships/Games, Pentathlon World Cups, CISM World Championships. The winner gets 60 points.

Level 3 and 4:

Regional Championships/Games and International World Ranking Competitions; depending on participation and strength they will be ranked as level 3 or 4 competitions. The winner gets 40 or 20 points, according to the level.

LA28 AND THE FUTURE OF UIPM

It's official: Modern Pentathlon will feature on the programme of the Los Angeles 2028 Olympic Games following an endorsement by the 141st Session of the International Olympic Committee (IOC).

In October 2023, IOC Members voted in favour of the IOC Executive Board's proposal to confirm the inclusion of Modern Pentathlon, along with Weightlifting and five new sports put forward by LA28 organisers – Baseball/ Softball, Cricket, Flag Football, Lacrosse and Squash – only for LA28.

The vote means Modern Pentathlon will continue its run of featuring at every Summer Olympic Games since it was introduced by Baron Pierre de Coubertin, founder of the modern Olympic Games, at Stockholm 1912.

In 2028 in Los Angeles (USA), a head-to-head sprint Obstacle race will be integrated into the Olympic Modern Pentathlon alongside Fencing, Swimming and Laser Run. The Obstacle discipline is inspired by the popular TV phenomenon, Ninja Warrior, based on the original SASUKE TV programme by TBS of Japan. Los Angeles is where American Ninja

Warrior is filmed.

With this new format, Modern Pentathlon is entering a new era with the potential to become one of the most exciting, accessible and popular sports in the Olympic movement.

In 2023 Obstacle was integrated into Modern Pentathlon at the UIPM Junior, U19 and U17 World Championships – and in many regional and national competitions.

That process will continue in 2024, before the new discipline becomes a permanent feature of the sport at all levels starting in 2025.

On the administrative side, UIPM signed a Memorandum of Understanding in August 2023 with the International Obstacle Sports Federation (FISO) with the shared aim of creating a sporting movement with more audience and active participants.

Under the terms of the MoU, UIPM will integrate FISO and oversee the wider Obstacle Sport movement.

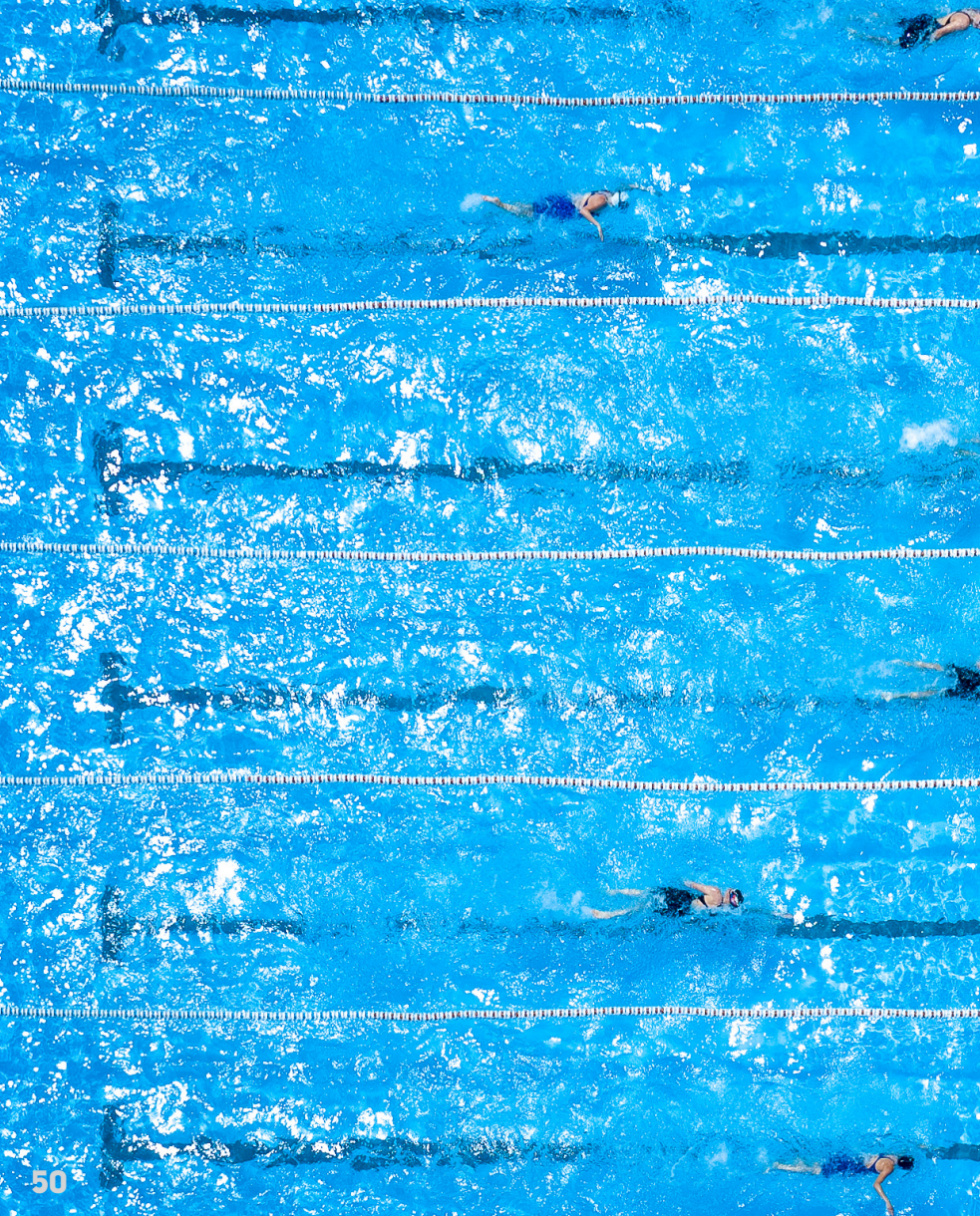

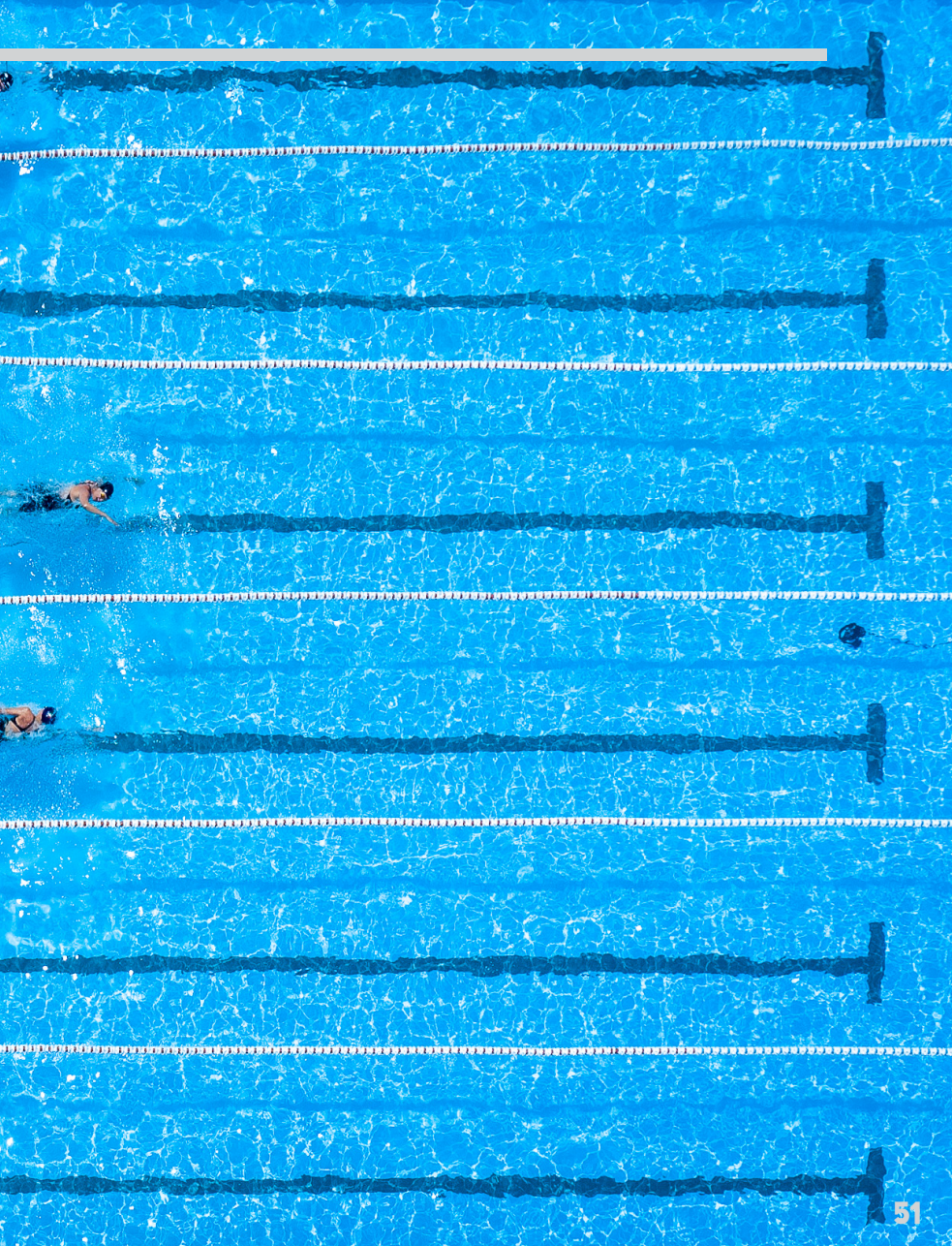

MODERN PENTATHLON TIMELINE

Modern Pentathlon was created by Baron Pierre de Coubertin, who sought to combine mental and physical challenge to "test a man's moral qualities as much as his physical resources and skills, producing thereby the ideal, complete athlete".

The sport has been ever-present in the Olympic Games since its introduction at Stockholm 1912. Now gender-equal, the sport has evolved considerably, with modern concepts and technology improving the sport and the spectator experience.

UIPM was formed in 1948, during the London Olympics where Wille Grut (SWE) won gold to complete an unusual double (he had also won silver in the Winter Pentathlon demonstration event in the Olympic Winter Games in St Moritz, France). Sweden continued to dominate, with several world titles and consecutive Olympic gold medals for Lars Hall in 1952 and 1956. Hall was the first pentathlete to win individual Olympic and world gold. But all the time athletes from the USSR, Konstantin Salnikov and especially Igor Novikov, were starting to get stronger...

1960s

Former Soviet Union (URSS) and Hungary were the dominant nations, winning all team gold medals at Olympic Games and World Championships. Igor Novikov, and then especially Andras Balczo (winning individual Olympic and several individual World Championships gold) from Hungary were the outstanding athletes, with Ferenc Török and Ferenc Nemeth winning Olympic gold as well.

1970s
MEN



After Andras Balczo was crowned as Olympic champion in 1972, he was succeeded by Janusz Peciak from Poland in 1976. He became the best athlete of this era, together with Pavel Lednev, four times individual world champion from the USSR. Poland was the only nation to break the USSR and Hungarian phalanx, by clinching several World Championships team titles. The only other athlete winning individual gold at a World Championships during this time was Bob Nieman from USA in 1979.

Whereas Poland (with Peciak and his teammates), Soviet Union (with Anatoli Starostin, World Championships and Olympic Champion) and Hungary (with a new, young team) kept winning, Italy became a strong nation, winning team gold in 1986, Olympic medals and individual World Championships titles with Daniele Masala and Carlo Massullo. By the end of the decade, all of the new Hungarian team comprised of Attila Mizser, Laszlo Fabian and Janos Martinek had won individual gold at either World Championships or Olympic Games and several team gold medals. Starostin, Peciak and Masala all won individual Olympic gold and individual World Championships gold.

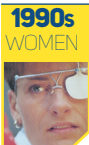

WOMEN



In the early years of women's Modern Pentathlon the dominant athletes were Irina Kiseleva and Barbara Kotowska (USSR) and Dorota Idzi (POL). But Sabine Krapf (GER), Eva Fjellerup (DAN) and the British team, well represented by Wendy Norman, and the French started to compete strongly. The first Women's World Championships took place in 1981 (individual + relay). Great Britain had a golden generation with Kathy Taylor and Sarah Parker winning a lot of team events.



Poland had strong individual athletes with Arkadiusz Skrzypaszek winning individual gold at the Olympics (1992) and World Championships (1991). Besides Hungary, Poland and USSR being strong teams the French became a strong Pentathlon nation. It started with Joel Bouzou winning individual World Championships gold in 1987, followed by team gold in 1994, and finally Sebastian Deleigne becoming a double individual world champion (1997/1998). The Russian athlete Dmitry Svatkovsky also won consecutive individual World Championships gold in 1994 and 1995.



Whereas Poland remained the dominant team and Italy was an emerging force, Eva Fjellerup from Denmark was the woman to catch as she won individual World Championships gold four times. Hungary, Germany, Italy, Russia and Belarus had very successful women athletes during this time as well.



Dmitry Svatkovsky completed his medal collection by winning individual Olympic gold in 2000 and leading a new Russian generation to several world titles. Andrey Moiseev became double Olympic champion (2004 and 2008). Besides established nations, new countries, such as Lithuania (Andrejus Zadneprovskis, Edvinas Krungolcas), Czech Republic (Michal Sedlecký) and also Germany (Eric Walther) had athletes winning World Championships and also Olympic medals. It was also the decade when Asian countries, led by South Korea and China, started to become strong contenders, especially with Zhenhua Qian winning individual World Championships gold in 2005.



Great Britain grew in strength, winning team and individual world titles and also gold and bronze at the first Olympic Games to feature women's pentathlon in 2000. Stephanie Cook (GBR), Zsuzsanna Vörös from Hungary and Lena Schoeneborn of Germany all won individual gold at World Championships and the Olympic Games. Amélie Caze from France enjoyed a remarkable period of dominance, winning the World Championships three times, while Schoeneborn (GER) became the youngest of the first three women's Olympic champions when she claimed gold in Beijing 2008 aged just 22.



At London 2012, David Svoboda emerged to take gold for the Czech Republic for the first time. Cao Zhongrong (silver) won China's first Olympic medal while 2009 world champion Adam Marosi (HUN) took bronze. In Rio de Janeiro four years later, Alexander Lesun (RUS) became champion after a strong and unflappable performance that gave no chance to the rest of the field. Pavlo Tymoshchenko (UKR) won silver and Ismael Hernandez Uscanga (MEX) won a sprint to the line for bronze.



Following the success of Schoeneborn (GER) in Beijing, Laura Asadauskaite from Lithuania nailed the victory in London 2012 with Samantha Murray (GBR, silver) and Yane Marques (BRA, bronze) joining her on the podium. However, the 2008 and 2012 champions were both eliminated during Riding at Rio 2016 and Chloe Esposito (AUS) engineered a stunning triumph. She was joined on the podium by Elodie Clouvel (FRA, silver) and Oktawia Nowacka (POL, bronze).

THE LEGACY OF COUBERTIN

Not long after the dawn of the 20th century, a French visionary named Baron Pierre de Coubertin had the idea to create a new sport linked to the philosophy of Pentathlon at the ancient Olympic Games - especially for the Modern Olympic Games he had recently established.

The Modern Pentathlon soon became celebrated as the ultimate examination of mind and body in Olympic sport. Coubertin's concept was introduced to the world at the Olympic Summer Games Stockholm 1912, and to this day, the influence of Coubertin is visible and profound.

Right across the UIPM Sports movement, the values of our founder are conspicuous – honesty and fair play, tenacity and courage, honour and sportsmanship – and in 2018

UIPM decided to establish a special day that would mark and celebrate Coubertin's legacy each year.
