The end of an Olympic cycle is a time for reflection. At UIPM, we set out in 2012 to build a bigger, stronger and smarter federation. It has been an exciting journey and there are many areas in which the UIPM has progressed substantially over the past four years, culminating in 2016 which was a wonderful year for our movement.

aving started with 85 National Federations in 2012, our family of full members has grown to 112 with even more countries improving in modern pentathlon and progressing towards joining this community. A lot has been accomplished thanks to the hard work of our global family and a group of very talented staff members that I have the honour to guide. Like the many volunteers who underpin our sport worldwide, these are professionals who breathe modern pentathlon on a 24/7 rhythm.

From three staff members in 2012, we are now 14 in total between full and part-time, and we have turned the Administration into a service-providing unit for our membership and an efficient support team for all UIPM events. We now service around 50 events every year, having increased our sporting portfolio from four to six during this cycle, introducing Triathle and Laser Run.

To manage the extra workload, the staff has been reorganized

into clear departments with precise functions – competition, communication, development, and administration – all designed to support stakeholders in a more efficient way. We now have guidelines on hosting, field of play design, media & marketing, visual branding elements, sports presentation, award ceremony, TV & streaming and nutrition.

UIPM now communicates through a cutting-edge digital ecosystem, comprising a modern website, eight social media platforms and an athletes' social media hub. Increased media exposure is supported by a stronger use of our new branding guidelines across all UIPM presentations, which has given us greater recognition in the eyes of stakeholders and media as well as more appeal for potential commercial partners.

Many new projects have been started and/or completed in the past three years, including EOS / CMS, our online system of event organization and competition management, academic studies

on development, the economic impact of UIPM events, digital benchmarking, ticketing and merchandising, the UIPM Shop and UIPM TV.

To improve the governance of UIPM and to stimulate debate and participation of more members, as well as accompanying our growth efforts, we have added four Commissions (Sport For All, Ethics, Finance and Athletes), 2 working groups (Instructor and Para) and one anti-doping panel. New statutes, internal regulations, and election rules provide for a transparent and democratic decision making process. A code of ethics has been approved and published on our website.

The administration now provides monthly reports and briefings to Executive Board members, accompanied by weekly briefings to National Federations and key stakeholder communications. We celebrate success with 12 UIPM Annual Awards distributed to athletes, teams, organizers and individuals.

In order to develop, we must spread resources around the world. We are proud to have developed academies and educational programs which are easily accessible through UIPM instructors, publications and online tools. We support coaches with annual conferences, clinics and seminars and a specific Coaches Certification Programme. Finally, equipment for training and

competitions provided by UIPM has reached over 65 countries.

The past four years at UIPM have been about growth but this should not be measured purely in numeric terms. Diversity is another major priority and we have grown in this respect too. In broadening our sport base, in affiliating ourselves to bodies like FISU and the IPC, we are building a structure that allows

any individual of any age in any country to access our sport.

UIPM is a federation which takes seriously its heritage, its responsibilities and its ambitions. We remain focused on clear goals under the heading of 4E – Education, Equipment, Empowerment and Expansion – from grassroots all the way to the Olympic Games.

# UIPM in the Olympic Family

Behind the scenes and beyond the field of play, UIPM worked hard on transforming the way it receives VIP guests during the Rio 2016 Olympic Games.

Hospitality is important not only because it allows UIPM dignitaries and office-bearers the chance to entertain important guests, such as the IOC President, but also because it presents an opportunity to express gratitude to those members of the UIPM Family who work hard to develop our movement 365 days a year, often in a voluntary capacity.

In Rio, the culmination of four years of progress in hospitality services was evident in a number of facilities that underlined the success of the Games as a diplomatic opportunity as well as a sporting event.

- UIPM created Olympic Family Lounges at two of its three venues within the Deodoro Olympic Park, the Youth Arena and Deodoro Stadium
- These facilities allowed the federation to entertain numerous VIPs from the Olympic Family including the IOC President, Dr Thomas Bach, who attended the Women's Fencing Bonus Round, Riding and Combined Event at Deodoro Stadium on August 20
- UIPM received dozens of other Olympic dignitaries during the three days of competition, and the Olympic Family Lounges allowed the UIPM President and members of the Executive Board to mingle with the decisionmakers of global Olympic sport
- On August 21 UIPM hosted a special VIP reception at the Flamengo club, which the Peace

As we prepare for the 2020 Olympic Games in Tokyo, we do so in the knowledge that our hospitality offering can be upgraded once more during that competition when all five Modern Pentathlon sports will take place in one stadium in the same day.

# UIPM donates Coubertin bust to Rio 2016 Olympic Village



Baron Pierre de Coubertin, founder of the Modern Olympic Games and the core Olympic sport of Modern Pentathlon, settled into a new home in the Olympic Village. A 30kg iron bust of Pierre de Coubertin (1863-1937) was donated to the Rio 2016 Organising Committee by the UIPM, and it was on display for athletes to see.

The bust, which is now permanently on display at the Olympic Museum in Rio de Janeiro, was created by the German artist Karlheinz Oswald. The idea was conceived by the International Pierre de Coubertin Committee through its President Prof Norbert Müller and UIPM President Dr Klaus Schormann.

It was presented to Rio 2016 by Dr Schormann, who was joined at the ceremony by Jacques de Navacelle de Coubertin, UIPM Secretary General Shiny Fang, Mayor of the Olympic Village Mrs Janeth Arcain and the Vice President of Brazilian Olympic Committee, General Augusto Heleno. Also presented in the ceremony was Francis Gabet, Director of IOC Museum in Lausanne and Robert Stull, Chief Executive Officer of US Modern Pentathlon.

Dr Schormann said: "The purpose of this donation is to remember and emphasize the importance of the founder of the Modern Olympic Games, Pierre de Coubertin.

"Modern Pentathlon is a special sport and the ancient pentathlon was the only sport created for the Olympic Movement. Modern Pentathlon is a living legacy in the Olympic Movement."

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Annika Schleu (GER) and Jun Woongtae (KOR) ended 2015 with the honour of being crowned UIPM Champion of Champions in Doha (QAT).

Schleu (GER) was joined on the Women's podium by another athlete who was destined to have a successful 2016: Chloe Esposito (AUS), who won silver. Bronze went to Gintare Venckauskaite (LTU).

In the Men's event, 20-year-old Jun (KOR) was pushed to the wire and confirmed his victory at the last shooting series of the Combined Event ahead of Justinas Kinderis (LTU), who claimed silver, and bronze medallist and compatriot Jung Jinhwa (KOR).

Dr Klaus Schormann, President of UIPM, said: "This competition offers good promotion for our sport in Qatar. All of us, including our athletes, will be very happy to return in future years for the Champion of Champions in Doha."

The city is contracted to continue hosting the year-ending Champion of Champions event in 2016 and 2017.



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The 2016 UIPM competition season began with some intense competition in the African Modern Pentathlon stronghold of Egypt, as athletes stepped up the race for Rio 2016 Olympic qualifying places.

# Schoeneborn takes initiative with opening World Cup win

ena Schoeneborn (GER) set the standard as the first gold medallist of the 2016 elite season by winning the Women's Individual event at UIPM World Cup #1 in Cairo (EGY).

Schoeneborn, the 2015 World Champion, led a German 1-2 as she took the title ahead of compatriot Annika Schleu. Elodie Clouvel (FRA) completed an all-European podium as she finished 3rd.

Schoeneborn (GER) said after receiving her gold medal: "Internally, this season is important – I have to be better than the others and keep collecting points."

UIPM 1st Vice-President Ivar Sisneiga said: "What we have seen here is all those athletes that have not qualified for the Olympic Games are fighting for their lives, they are going with everything. So even though it's the first World Cup of the season they are truly prepared."

# Elgeziry savours unforgettable win on home soil

Astunning home victory by Amro Elgeziry (EGY) provided a dream come true for organisers and spectators on the penultimate day of UIPM World Cup #1.

The victory by Elgeziry, one of the sport's most consistent performers, in the Men's Individual Final met with roars of approval from a large and supportive crowd in the Egyptian capital.

El Geziry (EGY) had never won a

World Cup event before but he produced an extremely polished performance from start to finish. All of the drama took place behind the leader, where Adam Marosi (HUN) and Valentin Belaud (FRA) crossed the line together in pursuit of silver with the Hungarian doing just enough to consign his French rival to bronze.

An elated Elgeziry (EGY) said: "I am so happy, no words could describe it. It's my first gold medal and it has happened in my home country. Everybody was cheering, and it was amazing. It was one of the best moments of my life."

# Mixed Relay: Fencing key to Italian success

taly claimed the first Mixed Relay gold medal of the 2016 UIPM World Cup series after an outstanding performance by Lavinia Bonessio and Auro Franceschini.

The Italians were in front with an unassailable lead for much of the day, and Mexico (Tamara Vega & Jorge Camacho) battled all the way to the line to secure silver ahead of bronze medallists Kazakhstan (Elena Potapenko & Vladislav Sukharev).

As the sun set on a terrific start to the elite Modern Pentathlon season in Cairo, Bonessio (ITA) said: "We are very happy with the competition today. All the way through qualifying our Fencing was bad but today we won the Fencing, which was a fantastic result and it allowed us to get the gold medal."

#### Para-Pentathlon: Test Event in Cairo

IPM advanced the credentials of Modern Pentathlon as a potential Paralympic sport as Cairo hosted the second official Para-Pentathlon Test Event, which doubled as Egypt's first Para-Pentathlon National Competition.

A 14-strong local team took part in Swimming and Fencing after three months of intensive training. There was one female and two male categories and the winners - Ashrakat Yehia, Mohamed Rami and Hady Ahmed Yousef - and other medalists were awarded their prizes at the official World Cup awards ceremony.

Sharif El-Elerian, EMPF President, said: "We are very happy to be the second nation to host a Para-Pentathlon Test Event.

"We formed the team straight after the first test in Argentina in September last year. Our national team consists of 10 girls and four boys and we are working to prepare more disabled athletes in Egypt to participate in Para-Pentathlon.

"I am very happy that we could host together with the World Cup the first ever national competition of Para-Pentathlon."

UIPM President Dr Klaus Schormann added: "The Para-Pentathlon competition is very important for us and today we made was another big step after the first event in Argentina.

"I am so thankful to my UIPM staff and the organisers of this event for what they have achieved with this group. Looking at the faces of the parents and the competitors, I think they were very happy and proud and I think we are going about this the right way."

Rio 2016 Olympic venues pass the test

Six days of competition in Rio de Janeiro saw the 2016 Olympic Games Modern Pentathlon venues fully tested by most of the world's leading pentathletes.

#### Cesarini reigns in the rain

Claudia Cesarini (ITA) conquered a tropical downpour and dozens of higher-ranked pentathletes to secure Women's Individual gold at World Cup #2.

Ranked 57 in the world ahead of this official Rio 2016 Test Event, the Italian trailed behind three of her Italian compatriots in the pre-event rankings but she proved her ability to seize the big stage. She started the Combined Event behind Qian Chen (CHN) and local favourite Yane Marques (BRA).

"It's a dream, and I can't believe it," said Cesarini (ITA).

The rain that arrived during the Combined Event remained so heavy that Cesarini (ITA), silver medallist Lena Schoeneborn (GER) and bronze medallist Donata Rimsaite (RUS) had to wait until the following morning to receive their medals.

# Jun makes the grade on World Cup circuit

Jun Woongtae (KOR) continued his impressive rise through the elite Modern Pentathlon ranks by securing Men's Individual gold at World Cup #2.

Aged 20, Jun's breakthrough success followed his victory in the season-ending 2015 Champion of Champions. He started the Combined Event in Rio in 6th place with a 25-second handicap but left the field behind him to win gold ahead of silver medallist Omar Elgeziry (EGY) and bronze medallist Adam Marosi (HUN).

"I'm so happy because, after the Champion of Champions, I promised myself that I would be better this year," said Jun (KOR) after his victory.

#### Mixed Relay: Gold for Germany as Schoeneborn stars again

ena Schoeneborn asserted her class once again when she teamed up with Patrick Dogue to win gold for Germany in the Mixed Relay at World Cup #2.

The final act of the Olympic Test Event in Rio became an intriguing tussle between Germany and Egypt, two countries that had already stamped their mark on this year's World Cup with medals both in Cairo and in Rio.

In the end the class of 2015 individual world champion Schoeneborn allowed the Germans to comfortably prevail, with Egypt (Haydy Morsy & Eslam Hamad) holding on to silver and consigning Japan (Natsumi Tomonaga & Tomoya Miguchi) to bronze.

Schoeneborn (GER) said: "For me this competition was good because it gave me some points for the internal Olympic qualifying ranking, which is still going on, and because it gave me some self-confidence to know that I can perform well in these venues."

ormal order was restored on the UIPM World Cup circuit as Laura Asadauskaite (LTU) won her first event of the season ahead of another member of the Olympic champions' club.

Asadauskaite, the London 2012 gold medallist from Lithuania, and Lena Schoeneborn, Germany's Beijing 2008 champion, reasserted their supremacy in the Women's Individual event by winning gold and silver respectively ahead of bronze medallist Anastasiya Prokopenko (Belarus).

Asadauskaite (LTU) said: "It was almost a perfect day. I enjoyed being on the podium because I won here in Rome last year and I am very happy to be back on the top of the podium. The process of Olympic preparation is getting better and better and I will keep it going."

## French men make podium their own

t was a day of dominance for France as Valentin Prades and Christopher Patte finished in 1st and 2nd place in the Men's Individual Final at World Cup #3 – with Valentin Belaud not far behind in 6th

Prades (FRA), a relay gold medallist in the 2014 World Championships, and Patte (FRA), who claimed a World Championships gold medal the year before in the team event, enjoyed their first taste of success in this Olympic season by taking gold and silver respectively, ahead of bronze medallist Jan Kuf (CZE).

Prades (FRA) managed to claim top spot despite having started the Combined Event in 9th place, while Patte (FRA) started 8th. Gold medallist Prades (FRA) said afterwards: "I'm very happy because it's an important season this year. It's Olympic qualification and this is a good performance for getting my ticket to Rio. I am so happy because we have trained hard for this. It's like winning the World Cup Final; it's the same feeling."

# Mixed Relay: Roman crowd savours Italian triumph

The host nation savoured the perfect climax to the third round of the 2016 UIPM World Cup as Italy (Lavinia Bonessio & Lorenzo Michele) claimed gold in the Mixed Relay.

It was a second Mixed Relay gold in three World Cup events for Italy and Bonessio, after she topped the podium alongside Auro Franceschini at World Cup #1 in Cairo.

Bonessio and Michele put in a blistering performance in the Combined Event that led them to 1st place ahead of the Czech Republic's sibling silver medallists (Lenka Bilkova & Martin Bilko) and bronze medallists Mexico (Mayan Oliver & Alvaro Sandoval).

# Prokopenko propels herself to front

After placing 35th in Swimming, 7th in Fencing and 17th in Riding, nobody expected Anastasiya Prokopenko (BLR) to be a podium contender at World Cup #4. Twelve astonishing minutes later, she was heading for the top step.

Prokopenko (BLR) is known for her running and shooting abilities but this was a truly miraculous turnaround. She began the Combined Event 48 seconds behind the leader and finished it with several seconds to spare as the winner ahead of local favourite Zsofia Foldhazi (HUN, silver) and starlet Julie Belhamri (FRA, bronze).

Prokopenko (BLR) said: "It's amazing, because three days ago in Budapest my coach said to me: 'Anastasiya, go to the World Cup and treat it like a training event for the World Cup Final.' And I said: 'No problem.' After the finish line, I could not believe I had finished in first place. It has been a fantastic day."

# Cooke stands between Hungary and glory

ames Cooke (GBR) became the second athlete in two days to come between Hungary and glory at UIPM World Cup #4.

A day after Anastasiya Prokopenko (BLR) consigned Zsofia Foldhazi (HUN) to silver, Cooke (GBR) refused to give the home crowd the gold they craved as he narrowly beat Hungarian duo Adam Marosi (silver) and Bence Demeter (bronze) to the line.

This was a third individual World Cup gold medal for Cooke (GBR), who had already tasted success in Hungary in 2013 and in the USA in 2015. He proved his calibre once again after a scintillating Swimming performance and an ice-cool showing on the Shooting range.

# Mixed Relay: Golden glory for Guatemala

Guatemala's development into a powerhouse of Modern Pentathlon in Central America received a glowing endorsement in Kecskemet when their leading duo of Isabel Brand and Charles Fernandez won Mixed Relay gold.

On the final day of World Cup #4, the powerful duo timed their campaign to perfection as they surged to the front of the field with a near faultless Riding performance.

Guatemala never looked back after that, finishing clear of Egypt (Sondos Aboubakr & Sherif Nazeir) in second with Germany (Alexandra Bettinelli & Alexander Nobis) stealing into the bronze medal position at the end as Spain's medal challenge fell narrowly short.

Brand (GUA) said: "It's my first World Cup medal and I am really, really pleased."



# Schoeneborn the star that shines brightest

ena Schoeneborn (GER)
completed an exemplary
campaign as she was crowned
winner of the UIPM World Cup
for the 3rd time in the Florida
sunshine.

The 2008 Olympic champion had waited five years for World Cup Final glory since her previous triumph, in London in 2011, which followed a breakthrough success in Moscow in 2010. But her task was complicated by the impressive leva Serapinaite (LTU), who capped a standout performance with a bronze medal to join Schoeneborn (GER) and silver medallist Zsofia Foldhazi (HUN) on the podium.

"This has been a long phase of training, from Colorado to here, and I'm very happy with the result," said Schoeneborn (GER). "Sometimes it's not only about Swimming and Running, but your mental strength on the day."

#### Cooke clears a path to glory

James Cooke (GBR) confirmed his status as one of the world's top pentathletes with the highlight of his career: individual gold at the World Cup Final.

Cooke, 25, built on his victory at World Cup #4 in Kecskemet and the gold medal he won at World Cup #1 in 2015 to prevail with a truly impressive display of self-assurance, control and intent. He stayed in contention all day, lurking behind the leaders, and pounced when he saw his chance.

In a final dominated by the Europeans, Patrick Dogue (GER)

won silver and Valentin Prades (FRA) claimed bronze.

Cooke (GBR) said: "It was the World Cup Final, there were big Olympic qualifying points on offer and everyone was fighting for them, and I know myself that the pressure was there. For me, it's brilliant that I've got a World Cup win and a World Cup Final win."

# Mixed Relay: Irish duo turn silver to gold

#### Kovacs (HUN) turns Moscow silver into gold


Modern Pentathlon crowned a new world champion and Hungarian pentathlon hailed a new heroine after Sarolta Kovacs won Women's Individual gold.

Kovacs (HUN), ranked 15 in the world before the competition, started the Combined Event with a slender lead of 9 seconds but she stunned her more celebrated rivals by stretching out in front with every lap of the stadium and holding her nerve at all of the Shooting ranges.

The results meant that Kovacs (HUN) guaranteed her place at the Olympic Games in Rio de Janeiro, along with silver medallist Elodie Clouvel (FRA) and bronze medallist Lena Schoeneborn (GER).

Kovacs (HUN) had competed little in the early season due to an injury that required surgery. But she did have pedigree at this championships, and at this particular venue having won silver at the 2011 World Championships in Moscow.

The 25-year-old said: "I can't believe it. This year has been hard for me with injury, and I had an operation two months ago. It's a big competition and I like Moscow. In 2011 I was here and I was first to start the Combined Event and second to finish it. So I like Moscow!"

#### **Brilliant Belaud (FRA) keeps** local favourite at bay

t was another day, another new world champion in Moscow as Valentin Belaud won Men's Individual gold for France.

A day after his girlfriend, Elodie Clouvel (FRA), won individual silver, Belaud (FRA) summoned fantastic stamina to rein in the leaders having started 6th in the Combined Event and he completed victory with a final 800m lap of stunning power.

Alexander Lesun (RUS) maintained his record of winning a medal at every World Championships since 2010 with silver, while Jung Jinhwa (KOR) took the bronze. All three men on the podium qualified automatically for the Olympic Games, while Belaud became France's first individual world champion since 2010 and first male since Sebastien Deleigne in 1998.

"I won in the last 100 metres and I am very happy. It's amazing," he said. "Yesterday Elodie won a silver medal and I'm very happy for her. Today, I won the gold medal and I'm just so happy."



#### Gold for Aurora, the starlet of Italy

Aurora Tognetti of Italy set her sights on the Tokyo 2020
Olympic Games after winning gold in the Women's Individual Final at the UIPM 2016 Youth A World Championships.

Tognetti, 17, finished 4th in the 2015 Junior World Championships and 3rd in the 2016 Junior European Championships, and there was no stopping her in Limerick as she conquered the best under-17s in the sport.

Joining her on the podium were silver medallist Xeina Fralcova (RUS), who led Russia to team gold, and bronze medallist Haydy Morsy (EGY), ahead of her Rio Olympic Games appearance.

#### Relays: Italy, Korea and Russia continue gold rush



### Women's Individual: Chloe Esposito makes herself a superstar

Modern Pentathlon crowned the first of two new Olympic champions when Chloe Esposito of Australia engineered a stunning victory at Deodoro Stadium.

Esposito (AUS) started the Combined Event in 4th place and overtook the top three with a superb exhibition of composure and stamina - in a new Olympic record score of 1372. Elodie Clouvel of France also reined in the leader, Oktawia Nowacka (POL), to claim silver and Nowacka (POL) held on to win a hard-earned bronze.

Esposito (AUS) reflected: "This year wasn't the best year, I didn't get to compete in any World Cups or other championships. It wasn't the best preparation for Rio, so at the beginning of the year I wasn't in the best spirits.

"Then, three months ago, everything changed: the injury got better and training was going well, and everything just fell into place.

"My coach, who is also my father Daniel, tells me the same thing before every competition. For each event I have a task, and if I do those tasks, then in my mind I have won. Today was a day when everything came together."

Nowacka (POL) started the day with a clear advantage from the Fencing Bonus Round at the Youth Arena. She scored 262 in the Ranking Round with 27 victories and eight defeats. Behind her were Lena Schoeneborn (GER) with 244 (24V/11D) and Melanie McCann (CAN) with 236 (23V/12D).

History was then made at the Deodoro Stadium as Bonus Round Fencing was introduced to the Olympic Games for the first time and Samantha Murray (GBR) won a remarkable eight matches.

Nowacka (POL) maintained her 12-point lead during the Riding competition. Two former Olympic champions, Laura Asadauskaite (LTU) and Schoeneborn (GER), scored zero after a series of refusals

In the Combined Event Nowacka (POL) kept distance between herself and 2nd-placed Clouvel (FRA) until the 3rd lap, having demonstrated great poise on the shooting range. But she began to tire and was caught on the final range by Esposito (AUS), who had been making steady progress and eating into her 45-second deficit, and by Clouvel (FRA).

There was no way strong runner Esposito (AUS) was going to be caught after leaving the range first, and she completed the final 800m with absolute focus to make history.

#### Men's Individual: Alexander Lesun leads from the front

esun (RUS) went into the Combined Event with a ninesecond lead and ended up winning by seven seconds from silver medallist Pavlo Tymoshchenko (UKR). Ismael Hernandez Uscanga (MEX) won a sprint to the line to claim bronze ahead of 4th-placed Valentin Prades (FRA) and 5th-placed Riccardo de Luca (ITA).

If the race for bronze was dramatic, Lesun's progress to the finish line was relatively serene.

Joseph Choong (GBR) stayed with him for the first two laps but after he became tied up at the second Shoot, it was Tymoshchenko (UKR) who became the hunter.

Even though Tymoshchenko (UKR) kept the pressure on the leader at the final Shoot, Lesun (RUS) had enough stamina to hold off his rival and add Olympic gold to his huge medal collection that includes two World Championship titles plus three silver medals and a bronze, plus multiple World Cup medals.

Invited to comment on his victory, Lesun (RUS) said: "I already set records before in fencing [on Thursday] and I just did my job. I was really upset [after finishing 4th at London 2012] but I tried to calm down and that was the main thing."

The victory of Lesun (RUS) was built on exceptional skill in the Fencing arena. His Olympic record score of 268 gave him a demonstrable advantage over his rivals who knew they would be playing catch-up unless the leader had a major setback in Riding.

In Riding, leader Lesun (RUS) incurred 21 penalty points for an overall score of 871 which gave fresh hope to the rest of the field. It meant that Joseph Choong (GBR) would start 2nd with a 9-second handicap and left Amro Elgeziry (EGY) a further 10 seconds behind.

The result was that 16 competitors - almost half of the field - would start the Combined Event within 45 seconds of Lesun (RUS), ensuring a dramatic race for the podium.

As it turned out, the penalties incurred by Lesun (RUS) on horseback were not sufficient to derail him and he accepted the challenge of leading from the front with great assurance and aplomb.

n all, 421 athletes from 22 nations battled high temperatures to take part in an exciting weekend of competitions catering for all ages from under-11 to over-60. There were excellent results from teams from Egypt and South Africa, demonstrating the global reach that the new format has already achieved.

#### Women's Relay: Russian duo conquer heat

n temperatures that rose to 35C, Russia drew first blood at the 2016 UIPM Junior World Championships in Cairo with gold in the Women's Relay.

It was the final Shooting series of the Combined Event that decided the outcome after Russia, Italy and Belarus arrived practically together in the range.

Alena Popova and Sofia Serkina (RUS) held their nerve to become gold medallists, leaving Alessandra Frezza and Irene Prampolini (ITA) with the silver and Iryna Prasiantsova & Volha Silkina (BLR) with bronze.

#### Men's Relay: It's Russia at the double

Serge Baranov and Alexander Lifanov from Russia were crowned Men's Relay champions on the second day of action at the UIPM 2016 Junior World Championships.

The Russians were consistent throughout a competition that saw 17 nations from across the world giving their all for the gold medal. In the end it was Baranov and Lifanov (RUS) who stood on top of the podium, repeating the success of their women compatriots just one day before.

The silver medal went to Lee Jihun and Jun Woongtae (KOR) with Daniele Colasanti and Gianluca Micozzi (ITA) clinching bronze.

#### Women's Individual: Kim dominates to win gold

After a day of warm sunshine, Kim Sunwoo of Korea conquered the field to claim the title of UIPM 2016 Junior World Champion in the Women's Individual Final.

With a convincing lead, Kim's victory demonstrated that the 14th place she obtained at the Rio 2016 Olympics Games last month has the potential to propel this 20-year-old Korean athlete to the podium at Tokyo 2020.

Kim (KOR) said after receiving her gold medal: "I still cannot believe it. It is my first medal even though I participated in so many international competitions this year. I am truly happy."

Francesca Tognetti (ITA) won silver and Sofia Serkina (RUS) claimed bronze, while Italy won gold in the team event.

#### Men's Individual: Fernandez wins epic finale

After one of the most dramatic finales ever seen in elite Modern Pentathlon, Charles Fernandez of Guatemala prevailed in an epic battle with Jun Woongtae of Korea to be crowned the UIPM 2016 Junior World Men's Individual Champion.

A classic duel between two of the five 2016 Olympians in the field ended with Jun (KOR) overtaking Fernandez (GUA) at the final Shoot, only for the 2015 Pan American Champion to regain the lead in the final 200m and seal a breathtaking victory. Alexander Lifanov (RUS) won bronze.

Fernandez (GUA) said: "I am very proud and actually I have no words to describe what happened today. This year has been an incredible journey and I have been so close to medals but at the same time so far away. To finish this competition the way I did, I am really happy."

Russia won team gold in a strong competition where the line-up featured five Rio 2016 Olympians.


#### Mixed Relay: Italy secure second gold in Cairo

Francesca Tognetti and Matteo Cicinelli gave Italy a convincing victory in the Mixed Relay on the final day of the 2016 UIPM Junior World Championships.

The Italian duo proved too strong for European rivals France (Pulcherie Delhalle & Brice Loubet), who claimed silver, and Germany (Alexandra Bettinelli & Marvin Faly Dogue), who took bronze as a high-quality championships drew to an exciting conclusion in North Africa.

Tognetti (ITA) said: "This is my last year as a Junior and I am very, very happy. Next year I will be Senior and I know it will be so difficult, but I feel happy."



There were some celebrated names on the start line at the 44th CISM Military World Championships but reputations counted for little by the time the podium places were decided.

#### Men's Individual: Egyptian duo keep Belaud at bay

World champion Valentin Belaud (FRA) had to settle for bronze in the Men's Individual event when he was beaten by an Egyptian one-two. Yasser Hefny (EGY) took top spot on the podium above silver medallist Sherif Rashad (EGY).

The North African duo kept each other in close company throughout the day but Rashad (EGY) gave himself an advantage over his rival after the Riding, only to see Hefny (EGY) produce an excellent Combined Event beat him to gold by five seconds.

#### Women's Individual: Khuraskina turns silver to gold

any eyes were on the Olympic silver medallist Elodie Clouvel (FRA) but her bid to become the Military World Champion came unstuck on horseback, where she incurred 33 penalty points.

Instead, there was a Russian onetwo on the podium as Ekaterina Khuraskina (RUS) and Svetlana Lebedeva (RUS) claimed gold and silver respectively. Yane Marques (BRA) won bronze after being overtaken by the fresh-legged Russian duo.

#### Mixed Relay: Nowacka builds on Rio success

Unsurprisingly, Egypt and Russia were the respective winners of gold in the Team events, but it was Poland who dominated the finale of the championships by winning gold in the Mixed Relay.
Rio bronze medallist Oktawia Nowacka (POL) teamed up with Jaroslaw Swiderski (POL) to enjoy a comfortable victory ahead of silver medallists Ukraine (Valeriya Permykina & Denys Pavluk), with Egypt (Sondos Aboubakr & Yasser Hefny) completing the podium.



More than 500 athletes from 25 countries gathered on the west coast of Florida to participate in the championships, with the USA winning all of the senior gold medals except the two claimed by Henrard (FRA).

Athletes aged from the Youth F category (eight and under) to Masters competed in two different formats over three days at Nathan Benderson Park in Sarasota, which was the host of the 2016 UIPM World Cup Final.

Alexandre Henrard of France confirmed his status as a master of multiple UIPM Sports with two gold medals at the 2016 UIPM Biathle/ Triathle World Championships.

In 2015, the French star won both of these competitions and also came out on top at the Laser-Run World Championships, so his tally of senior UIPM golds now stands at an incredible five in two years.

"I am a pentathlete, so I do Fencing and Riding too, but to win backto-back with both titles was definitely my aim and it will be the same next year," he said.

Other highlights of the 2016 Biathle-Triathle World Championships included:

- Africa was well represented with South Africa and Egypt enjoying excellent results across the agegroup spectrum, winning multiple gold and silver medals
- Pakistan competed in the open division for the first time and claimed two gold medals

Janusz Peciak, the UIPM Executive Board Member for Sport and the 1976 Olympic men's champion in Modern Pentathlon, said: "I am very impressed with the enthusiasm and passion of so many kids participating in these events.

"You see how well countries like South Africa are competing, and also India and Argentina are others. This is good for our sport and I believe in five or six years South Africa will be one of the top sports in pentathlon."


#### **UIPM Educational Platform**

uman resources are a central part of any institution and the UIPM is permanently tuned into this importance. In 2016 UIPM launched an educational online platform for coaches, instructors and judges with the aim of improving conditions and making our sports more sustainable in the future.

The main features of the UIPM Educational Platform include:

- A closed platform to communicate, share and collaborate
- An opportunity for coaches, instructors and judges to join communities based on their interests (e.g. Training, seminars, camps or anti-doping activities)
- To allow multiple projects to be created within each of these communities
- Document and publication storage to make it easier for users to share and access useful resources
- A forum feature to facilitate communication on topics within communities and projects
- A contacts database for the storage of biographical and contact information
- A calendar to mark important events and provide information about them





#### **Coaches Certification Programme (CCP)**

Tracing the roots of development, the UIPM also launched in October this year the Coaches Certification Programme (CCP), which is an essential tool to enable coaches to qualify as well as recognizing and rewarding their professional achievements. Knowledge gained in achieving the four levels of the CCP is critical to the development of the pentathlete, which is the UIPM's

most important function.
There are four certification levels (I, II, III and IV) regulated by the rules which are guidelines for coaches all over the world to pursue their careers in clear parameters, evolving gradually through the knowledge and practical skills needed to perform their role.
Coaches Level I (Development Coach), Level II (Coach), Level III (Senior Coach) and Level IV

(Elite coach) are critical to the development of the pentathlete. Given that, we hope all National Federations encourage their coaches to be part of the programme, dedicating an important part of their time to complete its different stages and develop even more citius, altius and fortius athletes.



#### **UIPM 2016 World Coaches Conference**

Manchester (GBR) – 11-13 November 2016

Pentathlon GB hosted the 4th UIPM World Coaches Conference (WMPCC) in Manchester (GBR). The conference is a consolidated event in UIPM calendar and this year we counted more than 90 delegates from 17 countries, the largest audience ever.

UIPM promoted an academic contest for coaches over the world as a major new feature of this occasion. The two winners were awarded with a complimentary trip to Manchester where they presented their work as speakers in the WMPCC.

### Universities



Since 2016 members of the global student community will have more opportunity than ever before to participate in Modern Pentathlon, one of the original Olympic sports, as a result of FISU's developing partnership with UIPM. A range of educational materials has been produced in an effort to encourage universities to create a Modern Pentathlon programme for their students.

This comprehensive package includes an introductory film about Modern Pentathlon and a tutorial that focuses on the Combined Event, the thrilling run/shoot spectacle that closes all UIPM competitions.

Also made available was a presentation information package to enable organizers to get in contact with universities and promote our sport in an easily understandable way.

#### 1st World University Championships in Modern Pentathlon

Budapest, the capital of Hungary, has been named as host of the 1st

Modern Pentathlon FISU World University Championships, which will be held in the summer of 2018.

The Championships will be held from July 2-8, 2018 at the National University of Public Service and "Orczy Park", with all venues located within 60m of each other. The city of Budapest - with its high-quality sports facilities, developed infrastructure, qualified workforce, strong cultural and sporting traditions especially in Modern Pentathlon - was an ideal choice for hosting this prestigious event in 2018. 

Modern Pentathlon is one of the most physically and mentally demanding sports in the world. It is the goal of UIPM to embrace all five continents that are active in the sports university movement and establish the movement as a strong pillar within our union.

In 2017 UIPM will stage an international university competition to boost this development.

### Para-Pentathlon



Para-Pentathlon has enjoyed a long and meticulous development over a period of 18 months since UIPM was granted membership within the International Paralympic Committee (IPC) family.

The project management approach has been subdivided into 3 phases:

- The launch and constitution of its working group led by President Schormann and Secretary General Fang
- 2. The research and milestones definition while mirroring best practice from other parainstitutions
- 3. The implementation of international standards and definition of a UIPM parapentathlon roadmap, including further testing and training supported by educational background and transfer of knowledge (TOK) from recognised experts.

This last phase has offered UIPM staff the concrete possibility to be hands-on, working in continuous contact with the relevant IPC authorities and developing a first series of contents relating to:

- 1. Classification & reclassification
- 2. TOK & research studies (evidence-based)
- 3. Testing (i.e. ARG EGY GUA)

A UIPM Para-Pentathlon Classification guideline draft is the most recent achievement made possible by UIPM during our presence and participation at the very first focus-on IPC workshop set up during the recent 2016 Paralympic Games held in Rio de Janeiro (BRA).

This TOK phase has expanded the vision around Para-Pentathlon and better defined the related progress to be implemented into project planning.

Therefore the actual parapentathlon sport classification has involved the suggestion of three main categories:

- Standing (2)
- Wheelchair-based (1)

This immediately offers new opportunities of selection and training to those National Federations already familiar with the Paralympic movement as well as to those new to this.

This classification offer is based on our general development plans for both Modern Biathle and Triathle, Laser-Run and Tetrathlon events with a very similar approach to the most recent addition to the IPC family in terms of multisports, thanks to the International Triathlon Union (ITU) research.

Best practice has also been implemented in the lead up to the classification guidelines definition thanks to the commitment of internationally recognized classifiers (IWAS etc) as well as to the fair exchanges with armed forces experts such as those part of CISM.

The next phases will focus on:

- Sporting events organization guidelines & 1st international event set-up
- Equipment use (selection, cost θ analysis)
- Athlete detection, selection and training (inc. TUE as per WADA principles)

Classification and re-classification revision over further testing.

### **Masters**



The Masters movement has grown in the past two years with an average participation of more than 90 athletes on various occasions over a series of events both in the winter and summer season.

he 2016 Masters World Championships in Prague (CZE) was the climax with more than 130 athletes from 26 different nationalities covering four continental federations (Africa, Americas, Europe and Oceania).

The UIPM Masters Database is continuously growing worldwide into six main competition categories: Modern Biathle, Run, Tetrathlon and Pentathlon.

opportunities to those Masters competing in both Modern Tetrathlon and Pentathlon, expanding and unifying the Masters family under the unique UIPM flagship.

with our laser shooting regulations. The incredible growth of this movement, thanks to the base created by strong communication amongst the German Masters community and the movements created in Eastern European nations such as Estonia, Russia and Ukraine (to name but a few) have offered new members a way to adhere to UIPM events in the smoothest way possible.

Masters eligibility has gone up from 30 to 35 years of age but the actual average age still goes beyond 46, which means one of the biggest challenges in the near future will be to decrease the average age,

attracting those athletes coming out from their senior events, becoming the future legacy of the UIPM family worldwide while offering them a continuous training opportunity and a safe competitive challenge.

Equipment has been also granted according to UIPM standards, especially in the use of laser pistols/targets and fencing gear in order to support the equipment testing made available at all major UIPM events while ensuring the safety of all athletes and the proper use of equipment on the field of play.

Moreover, riding licences have been granted to an overall 48% of those registered Masters athletes, making the riding (show-jumping) events safer for both competitors and Local Organising Committees (LOCs).

Finally, the UIPM Masters Committee has also granted fair eligibility. More than 10 nominees over four continents were confirmed for the first-ever online elections and three candidates were elected: Mr Peter Engerisser (GER), Ms Heidi Walli (FIN) and Ms Shereen Saleh (EGY), confirming the highest gender equality and geographical distribution score.

### **Anti-Doping**



The Olympic season of 2016 presented some challenges in the field of Anti-Doping for many sports, Modern Pentathlon included. The importance of testing activities has risen together with the revelations about an alleged Statesponsored doping system in Russia in November 2015. This issue was continuously investigated by WADA (World Anti-Doping Agency) and a team of independent investigators during the year 2016.

OIPM followed and reflected on new information presented by investigators in the McLaren Report with the aim of protecting clean and fair competition for all our athletes.

However, Modern Pentathlon remains one of the sports considered to be least affected by doping.

Doping control was present at all major events including the World Cup series, Continental Championships and World Championships in all categories (Senior, Junior, Youth A).

We also organized a series of unannounced Out-Of-


Competition doping controls. These are not linked to any specific event or place and can be implemented anywhere and anytime. The proportion of Out-Of-Competition controls has increased in 2016 and we would like to maintain this trend during the 2017 season.

UIPM Anti-Doping also takes care of athlete education and other activities towards athletes and coaches. To that end we participated in events and conferences organized by WADA including the WADA/ADO Symposium 2016.

UIPM is working on strengthening activities in the field of education

by organizing seminars at Youth and Junior competitions and proposing one-to-one education to interested parties. It is important to make athletes and coaches understand Anti-Doping is here not to set obstacles to the athletes in their routines but to help them and protect their right to equal competition.

To achieve this we would like to closely collaborate through National Federations with local NADOs (National Anti-Doping Organizations) that provide education programmes in local languages. Effective educational programme is investment into the healthy future of our champions of tomorrow.

### **Laser Shooting Technology**

Quite a few changes have been made. With several steps and efforts, significant improvements have been made, especially during past two years.

- Homologation standards and procedures have been made for all laser equipment used in Modern Pentathlon (targets and pistols). Those specifications serve as a guideline for the providers, but also criteria/ parameter for regulations and controls.
- The Test equipment which is today in use had to be developed and adapted. Test procedures for Lab-Tests and Onsite-Tests were established.
- Target systems and its performances have improved. Fairness for the competing athletes and a similar behavior as traditional (air)pistol shooting in the Combined Event have been fundamental principles. Functionalities have been unified to have similar, stable behavior of all products.
- New products and specialized Laser Pistols "Full Laser Pistols" have been brought to the market. Besides improved quality also safety aspects have been addressed. Better quality of laser pistols and beams.







# Marketing, Media and Promotion

UIPM made considerable progress during the 2012-16 Olympic cycle in the area of marketing, media and promotion. The federation, like each of the sports under its jurisdiction, is visible on TV, online, in print media and to the naked eye of spectators and stakeholders when they attend events. UIPM has never been more visible than in 2016 and this increased exposure brought home the importance of quality and consistency in the promotion of the image and brand.

This was the year when the digital ecosystem of UIPM became complete. Where previously the "UIPM world" consisted of unconnected digital parts, now it is integrated as a whole, and stronger as a result.

As of today, UIPM has the means to connect to 500,000 people online at the same time, with the potential to reach millions more. The growth of the internet has created

an appetite for content and engagement which is insatiable, such is the speed of change in consumer behaviour. But UIPM is meeting the challenge head-on. Now there is an integrated digital family comprising the new UIPM website, UIPM TV, the UIPM Shop and their social media siblings on Facebook, Twitter, Instagram, Pinterest, Linkedin, Snapchat, VK in Russia, and Sina Weibo & WeChat in China

This global network enables UIPM to talk directly to different age groups in different means at any time on a variety of platforms, devices and in three different languages: English, Russian and Chinese. One word that does not require translation is UIPM itself, and the brand was established as the title-holder on all digital platforms as part of a strategic move to establish UIPM ahead of Modern Pentathlon as the

recognised governing entity of a diverse range of sports.

Each of the social networks in the portfolio does the same thing: spread the word. Social media does the same job as the distribution vans that still carry newspapers overnight from print plants across territories to newsagents, albeit in lower numbers than they used to. Now the latest news and informative content is circulated via broadband fibre, and word is spread more quickly and with a reach that is limitless.

So what messages did UIPM transmit through these channels in 2016?

On Pentathlon.org, it took the form of news, results and magazinestyle digital features such as "A Day In The Life of a Modern Pentathlete".

UIPMTV.org allowed us to send another form of rich content around the world: video. Whether fans were tuning in to a live stream or catching up via highlights, the most important UIPM competitions were broadcast on this cuttingedge platform. In the same place fans could see what their favourite athletes were saying on their own social media, creating a full circle of real-time engagement.

The development of these two websites meant that a spectator could watch with their own eyes as a gold medallist crossed the line, check the result on a big screen and then refer back to it later on Pentathlon.org before watching the highlights package on UIPM TV. In the meantime the spectator could tweet a message of congratulations to the winner and receive a reply, then read a full report on Pentathlon.org after being notified on Facebook that it had gone live.


Later in 2016, the UIPM Shop came into being. A commercial enterprise aimed at creating revenue to be channelled back into the UIPM Sports, this retail outlet brings a fan the added benefit of being able to buy high-spec athlete clothing within minutes of watching their hero win an event. Equipment, merchandise and gifts are also for sale.

Another digital newcomer arrived on the scene in 2016: the UIPM Educational Platform.

This is a private network that allows communities within the UIPM family to communicate and collaborate. Those groups include coaches, judges and athletes. Documents and publications can be stored here, integrated with databases and discussion forums. UIPM online is no longer merely a sum of its parts. It is one organic whole, a digital resource that seeks to cater better for existing audiences and attract a new crowd to join in and interact, creating tomorrow's supporters, customers, sponsors, even tomorrow's

Of course, none of this online innovation would be worthwhile if the sport itself did not live up to the same standards of image and brand consistency. That is why UIPM in 2016 completed a two-year Visual Guidelines project, overhauling the way competitions and other events are seen on the ground and transmitted around the world via the lens.

In the beginning, conversations between UIPM and Local Organizing Committees were not always easy. It was a transitional process, but all UIPM events now benefit from a high consistency of presentation that incorporates venue dressing, awards ceremonies, VIP protocol and media coverage through press releases and other digital content. There have been two immediate positive consequences of the Visual Guidelines project: brand recognition by stakeholders and a broader appeal for potential sponsors.



The 2016 UIPM World Championships, held in Moscow (RUS), was the first to benefit from the fully-incorporated improvements in marketing & promotion. In media reach, TV production and high standards of competition, this could be hailed as the greatest World Championships yet.

In terms of literature and promotion, UIPM produced a Media Guide, a glossy Olympic Games brochure, Constitutional & Directory Books, a 2016 Coaches Conference leaflet, a Modern Pentathlon Stadium brochure and the Yearbook you are reading now. UIPM was represented at a number of international exhibitions: SportsProLive! in London (GBR) in April, Sportel in Monaco (MON) in October, HostCity in Glasgow (UK) in November and, still to come, the International Sports Convention in Geneva (SWI) in December.


The UIPM movement was advertised and featured in a number of editions of the following

This was a year of engagement, of evolution and, we hope you will agree, education and enjoyment.











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TOGETHER TOWARDS NEW OBJECTIVES






