ROAD TO TOKYO

With places at the Tokyo 2020 Olympic Games at stake, the 2019 Modern Pentathlon season is sure to be ultra-competitive between the world's best female and male athletes.

Two of the highlights of the season will be the UIPM Pentathlon World Cup Final in Tokyo (JPN) in June and the UIPM Pentathlon World Championships in Budapest (HUN) in September.

The gold medallists in Tokyo and the gold, silver and bronze medallists in Budapest (assuming they are different athletes) will each earn a place at the Games of the XXXII Olympiad.

Many of those who perform best at the various continental championships in 2019 will also qualify directly for Tokyo. There is one place for each gender on offer at the African Championships, six at the Asia/Oceania Championships (five for Asia and one for Oceania), five at the Pan American Games (two for NORCECA, two for South America and more for the next-highest finisher) and eight at the European Championships.

There are three important things to

note about the above: 1) only one athlete per country can qualify for the Olympics at any given event; 2) athletes can only win a place if they have not already done so; 3) all places won are secured on a quota basis. That means that if a country secures more than two quota places for either gender, they can decide which two athletes should represent them at the Games.

By the end of 2019, 24 male and 24 female athletes will have done what they needed to do to secure that coveted Olympic spot. That leaves another 11 vacancies for each of the individual events, with one place reserved for the host nation Japan.

Again there will be one place on offer to the World Cup Final champions in 2020 and three to the highest finishers at the World Championships.

Another six male and six female pentathletes will qualify via the UIPM Olympic World Ranking List. This is decided on June 1, 2020 and the places will be given to the top-ranked athletes who have not already qualified.

Finally, the International Olympic

Committee will issue two invitational places for each gender based on applications to the Tripartite Commission. Submissions must be made by National Olympic Committees between October 14, 2019 and January 15, 2020 and the IOC will announce the successful applicants once all other qualifiers have been determined.

The final deadline for Tokyo 2020 sport entries is July 6, 2020, with the Games beginning 18 days later. As is customary, the Modern Pentathlon will be one of the closing events of the Olympics, taking place on August 6-8 at the Tokyo Stadium.

MEDIA & TV COVERAGE

UIPM's live broadcast product reached record numbers of viewers around the world in 2018, culminating in the most dramatic finish in the history of Pentathlon, when James Cooke (GBR) overtook Valentin Prades (FRA) on the finish line in Mexico City (MEX) to become world champion.

Not all gold medals are decided by a fraction of a second but the Laser Run that brings Pentathlon competitions to a climax is always a compelling spectacle - and once again TV audiences around the world will experience the drama live in 2019.

The 90-minute programme features 45 minutes of highlights from Swimming, Fencing and Riding and 45 minutes of live footage from Laser Run and the award ceremony.

Over at UIPM.TV, online viewers can watch a live stream that also includes the disciplines of Riding and, in the Pentathlon World Cup Final and Pentathlon World Championships, Swimming.

A 30-minute highlights package will also be available on UIPM TV, extending to 60 minutes for the Pentathlon World Cup Final and Pentathlon World Championships.

At the end of all Category-A Pentathlon competition finals, a video news report (VNR) is delivered. These edits include interviews and footage from the day's action. Specific interviews and footage of certain athletes can be arranged upon request.



UNDERSTANDING PENTATHLON

SWIMMING

The Swimming event is a 200m freestyle race. The heats are seeded according to each swimmer's personal best time, with the fastest swimmers competing in the final heat.

A time of 2min 30sec is worth 250 pentathlon points and one point is added to an athlete's score for each 0.5sec they can swim faster than this time. Similarly, one point is deducted from an athlete's score for each 0.5sec exceeding 2:30.00. For example, a time of 2:29.50 will result in a score of 251. A time of 2:30.50 will result in a score of 249.

The value of Swimming scoring in Modern Pentathlon was adjusted from 3 points per second to 2 points per second at the 68th UIPM Congress in Frankfurt (GER) in 2016. The move was designed to stimulate the development of pentathletes in nations where Swimming facilities are not up to international standards.

FENCING

Pentathletes take part in épée fencing, competing against all other athletes in a Ranking Round, needing just one hit within one minute to win. If neither fencer has scored a hit after 60sec they both register a defeat. An athlete who wins 25 of their 35 bouts will get 250 pentathlon points, with each victory or defeat above or below this number worth a plus or minus score of six points.

Since 2015 UIPM has added a new, dynamic and spectator-friendly element to Fencing. Competitions now include a Bonus Round, which allows athletes to add to their score by winning elimination bouts on a showpiece piste. Each bout lasts 30sec and the event takes place on a stage on the same field of play as the Riding and Laser Run.

The pentathletes' points from the Ranking Round are taken over to the final round. The competition is carried out in reverse order, with the last-place athlete going first against the next-placed athlete. The winner of each bout will be matched against the next best-ranked pentathlete. In this way, a pentathlete may continue to advance as long as they continue to win matches. Athletes receive one bonus point for each bout they win.

RIDING

In the Riding event, athletes have to complete a show jumping course that is between 400m and 450m including 12 obstacles and 15 jumps, in a set time.

The horses are assigned randomly and each athlete only has 20 minutes and five practice jumps to get to know the horse in the warm-up ring, before coming out to compete.

A clear round within the time allowed is worth 300 pentathlon points. Competitors lose seven points for each jump they knock down, and 10 points for a refusal to jump or a fall, which is equivalent to a 10sec handicap in the Laser Run. They also lose one point for each second they are over the allowed time.

It is mandatory to cross the final line, otherwise the rider will be eliminated with zero points for Riding.

LASER RUN

The climax of the pentathlon is a combined running and shooting event. Athletes start with a handicap according to their points tally and run four 800m circuits interspersed with four rounds of laser shooting where they must hit five targets at range of 10m.

Athletes can start running the next 800m leg once they have hit the target five times. If they take longer than 50sec they are allowed to continue, but any hopes of a medal will have gone.

The competitor who has amassed the most points in the first three disciplines starts the Laser Run first, and the handicap system ensures that the first person to cross the finish line wins the gold medal. The terminology of this discipline was changed from Combined Event to Laser Run in 2016.

2018 IN REVIEW

Pentathlon, a day-long struggle across fencing piste, swimming pool, jumping course, shooting range and running course, rewards perseverance. It also lends itself to compelling drama. These were two of the hallmarks of the UIPM 2018 Pentathlon World Championships – a fitting climax to an amazing season. In this section you can read a summary of the elite competitions as well as the World Championships at Junior and Youth level.

PENTATHLON WORLD CUP

FEB 27 - MAR 4

CAIRO (EGY)

Rio 2016 Olympic silver medallist **Elodie Clouvel (FRA)** opened the 2018 season in style with a commanding Women's Individual victory ahead of silver medallist **Tamara Alekszejew (HUN)** and third-placed **Ilke Ozyuksel (TUR)**.

Christopher Patte (FRA) continued the dominance of France by winning Men's Individual gold ahead of compatriot **Valentin Belaud (FRA)** and **Pavel Ilyashenko (BLR)**.

France won a fourth medal in the Mixed Relay – a silver behind **Italy (Gloria Tocchi & Gianluca Micozzi)**.

MAR 24 - APR 1

LOS ANGELES (USA)

Gulnaz Gubaydullina (RUS) confirmed her world No.1 status with a well-controlled Women's Individual victory ahead of **Alice Sotero (ITA)** and **Tamara Alekszejew (HUN)**.

Lee Jihun (KOR) picked up his first World Cup Men's Individual crown as he pipped **Bence Demeter (HUN)** to gold after a mass sprint finish, with **Balasz Szep (HUN)** claiming bronze.

Italy proved their prowess in the Mixed Relay once again as **Alessandra Frezza** and **Riccardo de Luca** won gold ahead of host nation **USA** and neighbouring **Mexico**.

MAY 3-7

KECSKEMET (HUN)

Rio 2016 Olympic champion **Chloe Esposito (AUS)** confirmed her return with a superb Women's Individual gold medal, consigning **Anastasiya Prokopenko (BLR)** to silver and **Kim Sunwoo (KOR)** to bronze.

Korea enjoyed another Men's Individual success thanks to **Jun Woongtae** winning gold ahead of **Ilya Palazkov (BLR)** and **Bence Demeter (HUN)**.

Host nation **Hungary** enjoyed a fairytale ending as **Sarolta Kovacs** and **Demeter** won Mixed Relay gold from **Ireland** and **China**.

MAY 22-27

SOFIA (BUL)

Kate French (GBR) won her second Women's Individual World Cup gold with a strong victory over silver medallist **Natalya Coyle (IRL)** and third-placed **Uliana Batashova (RUS)**.

There was another medal for **Ireland** as **Arthur Lanigan-O'Keeffe** triumphed in the Men's Individual event ahead of **Jun Woongtae (KOR)** and **Pierre Dejardin (FRA)**.

Mixed Relay gold went to **Czech Republic (Eilska Pribylova & Jan Kuf)** after a convincing win. They were joined on the podium by **Egypt** and **Belarus**.

ASTANA (KAZ) JUNE 21-24

PENTATHLON WORLD CUP FINAL

With 24 international TV networks relaying the action around the world, the first Pentathlon World Cup Final in **Astana (KAZ)** was a roaring success as 72 athletes vied for the title of World Cup Final winner – and three different continents supplied the gold medalists.

Rio 2016 Olympic champion **Chloe Esposito (AUS)** won the Women's Individual title for the first time after a typically determined fightback.

Esposito (AUS) overturned a Laser Run deficit of 13sec to consign **Sarolta Kovacs (HUN)** to silver, while bronze went to **Gintare Venckauskaite (LTU)**.

Another athlete of the highest pedigree topped the Men's Individual podium, as 2017 world champion **Jung Jinhwa (KOR)** headed up a Korean 1-2.

Jun Woongtae (KOR) continued his excellent season with silver while **Arthur Lanigan-O'Keefe (IRL)** picked up the bronze.

Italy completed an excellent sequence of Mixed Relay results as **Alice Sotero** and **Riccardo de Luca** took home the final gold of the Pentathlon World Cup season.

There was more success for **Korea as Kim Sunwoo** and **Lee Jihun** claimed silver ahead of bronze medallists **Ukraine (Valeriya Permykina & Pavlo Tymoshchenko)**.

CALDAS DA RAINHA (POR) APR 7-16

UNDER 19 WORLD CHAMPIONSHIPS

Egypt plundered a remarkable six medals from the biggest-ever gathering of teenage pentathletes, three more than nearest rivals **Italy** and **China** and matching their own 2017 tally.

Ahmed Elgendy (EGY) was the star of the show, winning gold in the Men's Individual and Mixed Relay alongside **Salma Abdelmaksoud**.

Alice Rinaudo (ITA) led an Italian 1-2 in the Women's Individual Final, joined by **Maria Lea Lopez (ITA)** on the podium in **Caldas da Rainha (POR)**, where 220 athletes took part.

KLADNO (CZE) 29 JUL - 6 AUG 2016

JUNIOR WORLD CHAMPIONSHIPS

Twelve nations from four continents went home with medals from the UIPM 2018 Pentathlon Junior World Championships.

As in 2017, **Italy** were the top-performing nation and won five medals including two golds, while **Korea** and **China** each claimed three medals and the other five gold medals were spread between host nation **Czech Republic**, **Egypt**, **Guatemala**, **Hungary** and **Russia**.

The Women's Individual gold was claimed by **Elena Micheli (ITA)** while **Ahmed Elgendy (EGY)** added the world crown for under-21 pentathletes to his Under-19 title.

MEXICO CITY (MEX) SEP 6-15

PENTATHLON WORLD CHAMPIONSHIPS

The 2018 UIPM Pentathlon World Championships in **Mexico City (MEX)** was much more than a competition. There was the unveiling of the new Pentathlon Stadium – a world first – and the celebration of the 1st Pierre de Coubertin Pentathlon Day. But on the field of play, the action was also immense and historic.

Belarus (Iryna Prasiantsova & Anastasiya Prokopenko) kicked off by winning gold in the Women's Relay ahead of **Germany** and **Guatemala**.

France (Valentin Belaud & Alexandre Henrard) narrowly

defeated silver medallists **Czech Republic (XX)** in the Men's Relay, with **Bulgaria** claiming bronze.

Thirteen years after winning her first international gold, the experienced **Prokopenko (BLR)** enjoyed the crowning glory of her career when she became Women's Individual world champion. **Annika Schleu (GER)** and **Marie Oteiza (FRA)** joined her on the podium.

Extraordinary drama followed in the Men's Individual Final as **Jamie Cooke (GBR)** overtook **Valentin Prades (FRA)** to win gold via photo finish. Bronze went to **Pavlo Tymoshchenko (UKR)**.

Germany (Rebecca Langrehr & Fabian Liebig) signed off with Mixed Relay gold ahead of **Hungary** and **France**.





YOUTH OLYMPIC GAMES

The 3rd Youth Olympic Games in Buenos Aires (ARG) in October 2018 once again featured Men's and Women's Pentathlon competitions as well as the unique Mixed International Team event.

Egypt, who had never previously won an Olympic pentathlon medal at any level, enjoyed a remarkable clean sweep.

Salma Abdelmaksoud (EGY) began by leaving all rivals in her wake to claim gold in the Women's Individual event.

Ahmed Elgendy (EGY) then added the YOG crown to his gold medals from the UIPM Junior and Under 19 World Championships in 2018.

On the final day of an event that featured packed tribunes throughout, there was yet more glory for Egypt as Elgendy (EGY) teamed up with Gu Yewen of China to win the Mixed International Team event.

To the delight of the local spectators, Franco Serrano of Argentina paired with Abdelmaksoud (EGY) to win the silver medal.

WORLD RANKING

HOW DOES IT WORK?

The PWR is the official list used to rank pentathletes. It includes the ranking points awarded to the pentathletes according to their three best placing in the official UIPM international competitions held during the preceding 12 months. If during this 12-month period there are 2 competitions of the same type (example: 2 CCh, 2 WCh, 2 WCF) only the most recent will be included in the PWR.

There are PWR individual lists for Senior, Junior and Youth, for both genders and Relays.

Every pentathlete earns PWR Points according to the level of the competition and his/her final place as specified in the PWR Point Table.

WHICH LEVEL OF COMPETITIONS EXIST?

There are four (4) level of competitions.

Level 1:
Olympic Games, World Championships, World Cup Final. The winner gets 80 points. Following places earn points according to points table

Level 2:
Continental Championships/ Games, World Cup Competitions, CISM World Championships. The winner gets 60 points

Level 3 and 4:
Regional Championships/Games and International World Ranking Competitions, depending on participation and strength they will be ranked as level 3 or 4 competitions. The winner gets 40 or 20 points, according to the level.

MODERN PENTATHLON TIMELINE

Modern Pentathlon is a unique multi-discipline sport created by the Olympic Games founder, Baron Pierre de Coubertin, that combines mental and physical challenge to find the most complete athlete. It evolved out of the Ancient Pentathlon at the 1912 Stockholm Olympics. It was Baron Pierre De Coubertin's belief that the Modern Pentathlon event

would "test a man's moral qualities as much as his physical resources and skills, producing thereby the ideal, complete athlete". Pentathlon has evolved considerably over the years. It adopts modern concepts and latest technology to improve the competition and the spectator and fan experience.

OUR COMPETITIONS

PENTATHLON AND OTHER UIPM SPORTS

UIPM WORLD CHAMPIONSHIPS

World Championships take place annually for Senior (22 and over), Junior (19-21 years) and Under 19 male and female athletes, who compete in individual, team and relay events. The Under 19 World Championships adopt the Tetrathlon format, which does not include Riding.

Athletes qualify for the Final via qualification groups of up to 38 athletes per group. So, in the case of three groups, the top 10 placed athletes qualify directly from each group, with the next best six athletes from all groups rounding out the field. The athletes then compete in the Final, which is comprised of the best 36 competitors from these qualifiers. Individual medals are awarded along with team medals – at the World and Continental Pentathlon Championships – which are decided by adding the top three individual team members' scores together. The relays consist of up to 24 teams of two athletes, competing in a continuous relay across all five disciplines in one day. Each team member swims 100m, fences one opposing team member, rides a horse over nine obstacles and finishes the competition with

the Laser Run, which consists of two shooting series and two 800m running laps. Relays are an exciting spectacle requiring contribution from both team members in every event, and the climax of all World Championships and Pentathlon World Cups is the Mixed Relay, where men and women have competed in unison since 2009. The Men's and Women's Relays only take place at World and Continental Championships.

UIPM PENTATHLON WORLD CUP

A World Cup series for men and women has been organized since 1990 and was renamed the Pentathlon World Cup in 2018. Each year there are a number of World Cup competitions in different countries, culminating in a World Cup Final. The best 36 athletes qualify for the World Cup Final via a ranking list using the three best results of each athlete at the four World Cups.



TETRATHLON (FENCE-SWIM-RUN-SHOOT)

It is, to all intents and purposes, Pentathlon without the horses. Tetrathlon has become a vital part of the UIPM portfolio because it combines Fencing, Swimming and Laser Run and is therefore the perfect audition for our ultimate five-sport test.

Tetrathlon is now the favoured format for many important events including the Youth Olympic Games (YOG), University competitions and the Masters circuit. It is also used for Under 19 and Under 17 competitions, allowing teenage athletes to qualify for the YOG.



TRIATHLE
(SHOOT-SWIM-RUN)

Through Triathle, the UIPM has established a platform to encourage young athletes to practise Pentathlon starting from the basic disciplines of Running and Swimming and then progressing into Shooting to slowly become full pentathletes.

Triathle begins normally with a pack start of runners for the first 25m, followed by athletes competing in the first of multiple shooting series of five shots each, prior to approaching the transition area and then swimming before running the final leg to the finish line.

It was introduced in 2012 and is designed as a Beach Games sport.



BIATHLE
(RUN-SWIM-RUN)

Biathle was established in Monaco in 1999. Through Biathle the UIPM has established a competition comprising of two fundamental components of Modern Pentathlon and represent the most practised sports in the world – running and swimming.

Like Triathle, it lends itself perfectly to a Beach Games environment.

The Biathle competition begins with a pack start of runners who complete one-half of the total running distance before entering a 50m transition area. Athletes then dive into the water and swim the required swimming distance before exiting the water, putting on their shoes and running the second leg of the run to the finish line.



LASER RUN
(SHOOT-RUN)

Laser Run, the fastest-growing of all UIPM Sports, was launched in 2014 to increase international interest in the movement and give more athletes an entry point and a pathway to Pentathlon. It enables all athletes in the world to overcome difficulties in terms of access to new technologies, systems and equipment which might be a barrier to many sporting careers.

Laser Run consists of laps of a running circuit and rounds of laser shooting and can take place in various environments including cross-country, track, urban centres, indoor arenas and beaches. Its 'plug and play' approach, ease of installation and the uniqueness of the concept has facilitated its rapid growth in recent years.



WORLD SCHOOLS BIATHLON
(SWIM-RUN)

In 2005 UIPM launched a new competition linked to the success of Biathle. The event consists of Swimming (in a 25m or 50m pool) and Running (preferably on a standardized track although it can also be carried out on a flat surface if extra care is taken so that the distances are correct). Swimming takes place first and the Running begins with a mass start. The final result is the sum of the total points.

The success and originality of the World Schools Biathlon is that schools take part in this international competition by entering their results in a global database using the UIPM website (www.pentathlon.org) directly from their location.

70TH UIPM CONGRESS

The 70th UIPM Congress in November 2018 was hailed as a powerful demonstration of good governance and democratic decision-making.

Eighty nations were represented at a two-day Congress in Limassol (CYP) that featured the unanimous passing of a range of motions proposed by the UIPM Executive Board, the appointment of an Electoral Committee and the confirmation of competition dates for 2019 and 2020.

Four new member nations – Jamaica, Malawi, Paraguay and Uganda – joined the UIPM Family and it was announced that an observational working group will be set up to review the rules of non-Olympic sports before the next Congress – now a biannual event – in China in 2020.

The 2018 UIPM Congress concluded with high-quality presentations from the Sport Department of the International Olympic Committee and the Tokyo 2020 Olympic Games Organising Committee.

The Congress was also notable for marking the 70th anniversary of the Union Internationale de Pentathlon Moderne (UIPM), founded in 1948 during the Olympic Games in London. A special gala dinner was held to commemorate the occasion and to hand out the 2018 UIPM Annual Awards.

Congress also approved motions from the UIPM Executive Board relating to the updating of UIPM's election rules, code of ethics, statutes and rules on internal organisation, while a new set of betting and anti-corruption rules was approved.

Based on the approval of the updated election rules, Congress appointed a new UIPM Electoral Committee and elected three individuals from different continents to become the first members of the committee. They are Dr Gyula Bretz (HUN), Angela Ives (CAN) and Richard Gomez (PHI).

The UIPM Executive Board confirmed that the 2020 Pentathlon World Cup Final will take place in Seoul (KOR) in May 2020, completing a set of key events taking place in Asia that year, with the Olympic Games in Tokyo (JAP), UIPM Pentathlon World Championships in Xiamen (CHN) and UIPM Congress also going to China.

Elsewhere in 2020, it was confirmed that the UIPM Biathlon/Triathlon World Championships will be held in Weiden (GER) in July, and the UIPM Masters World Championships will take place in Győr (HUN) from September 23-27.

The Executive Board also approved the final UIPM calendar for 2019, including Pentathlon World Cup Sofia (BUL) and the Junior World Championships in Drzonkow (POL).

HIGHLIGHTS, HEROES & RECORDS

1950s
MEN



UIPM was formed in 1948, during the London Olympics where Wille Grut (SWE) won gold to complete an unusual double (he also won silver in the 1948 Olympic Winter Games in Saint Moritz). Sweden continued to dominate, with several world titles and consecutive Olympic gold medals for Lars Hall in 1952 and 1956. Hall was the first pentathlete to win individual Olympic and world gold. But all the time athletes from the USSR, Konstantin Salnikov and especially Igor Novikov, were starting to get stronger...

1960s
MEN



Former Soviet Union (URSS) and Hungary were the dominant nations, winning all team gold medals at Olympic Games and World Championships. Igor Novikov, and then especially Andras Balczo (winning individual Olympic and several individual World Championships gold) from Hungary were the outstanding athletes, with Ferenc Török and Ferenc Nemeth winning Olympic gold as well.

1970s
MEN



After Andras Balczo was crowned as Olympic champion in 1972, he was succeeded by Janusz Peciak from Poland in 1976. He became the best athlete of this era, together with Pavel Lednev, four times individual world champion from the USSR. Poland was the only nation to break the USSR and Hungarian phalanx, by clinching several World Championships team titles. The only other athlete winning individual gold at a World Championships during this time was Bob Nieman from USA in 1979.

1980s
MEN



Whereas Poland (with Peciak and his teammates), Soviet Union (with Anatoli Starostin, World Championships and Olympic Champion) and Hungary (with a new, young team) kept winning, Italy became a strong nation, winning team gold in 1986, Olympic medals and individual World Championships titles with Daniele Masala and Carlo Massullo. By the end of the decade, all of the new Hungarian team comprised of Attila Mizser, Laszlo Fabian and Janos Martinek had won individual gold at either World Championships or Olympic Games and several team gold medals. Starostin, Peciak and Masala all won individual Olympic gold and individual World Championships gold.

WOMEN



In the early years of women's Modern Pentathlon the dominant athletes were Irina Kiseleva and Barbara Kotowska (USSR) and Dorota Idzi (POL). But Sabine Krapf (GER), Eva Fjellerup (DAN) and the British team, well represented by Wendy Norman, and the French started to compete strongly. The first Women's World Championships took place in 1981 (individual + relay). Great Britain had a golden generation with Kathy Taylor and Sarah Parker winning a lot of team events.

1990s
MEN



Poland had strong individual athletes with Arkadiusz Skrzypaszek winning individual gold at the Olympics (1992) and World Championships (1991). Besides Hungary, Poland and USSR being strong teams the French became a strong Pentathlon nation. It started with Joel Bouzou winning individual World Championships gold in 1987, followed by team gold in 1994, and finally Sebastian Deigne becoming a double individual world champion (1997/1998). The Russian athlete Dmitry Svatkovsky also won consecutive individual World Championships gold in 1994 and 1995.

WOMEN



Whereas Poland remained the dominant team and Italy was an emerging force, Eva Fjellerup from Denmark was the woman to catch as she won individual World Championships gold four times. Hungary, Germany, Italy, Russia and Belarus had very successful women athletes during this time as well.

2000s
MEN



Dmitry Svatkovsky completed his medal collection by winning individual Olympic gold in 2000 and leading a new Russian generation to several world titles. Andrey Moiseev became double Olympic champion (2004 and 2008). Besides established nations, new countries, such as Lithuania (Andrejus Zadneprovskis, Edvinas Krungolcas), Czech Republic (Michal Sedlecký) and also Germany (Eric Walther) had athletes winning World Championships and also Olympic medals. It was also the decade when Asian countries, led by South Korea and China, started to become strong contenders, especially with Zhenhua Qian winning individual World Championships gold in 2005.

WOMEN



Great Britain started to become a very strong team, winning team and individual gold medals at World Championships and also winning gold and bronze at the first Olympic Games to feature women's pentathlon in 2000. Zsuzsanna Vörös from Hungary and Stephanie Cook (GBR) both won individual gold at World Championships and the Olympic Games. Amélie Caze from France and Lena Schoeneborn from Germany became the next athletes to wear the crown, Caze winning the World Championships three times and Schoeneborn claiming Olympic gold in Beijing in 2008.

2010s
MEN



At London 2012, David Svoboda emerged to take gold for the Czech Republic for the first time. Cao Zhongrong (silver) won China's first Olympic medal while 2009 world champion Adam Marosi (HUN) took bronze. In Rio de Janeiro four years later, Alexander Lesun (RUS) became champion after a strong and unflappable performance that gave no chance to the rest of the field. Pavlo Tymoshchenko (UKR) won silver and Ismael Hernandez Uscanga (MEX) won a sprint to the line for bronze.

WOMEN



Following the success of Lena Schoeneborn (GER) in Beijing, Laura Asadauskaitė from Lithuania nailed the victory in London 2012 with Samantha Murray (GBR, silver) and Yane Marques (BRA, bronze) joining her on the podium. However, the 2008 and 2012 champions were both eliminated during Riding at Rio 2016 and Chloe Esposito (AUS) engineered a stunning triumph. She was joined on the podium by Elodie Clouvel (FRA, silver) and Oktawia Nowacka (POL, bronze).

THE LEGACY OF COUBERTIN

Not long after the dawn of the 20th century, a French visionary named Baron Pierre de Coubertin had the idea to create a new sport especially for the modern Olympic Games he had recently established.

The Modern Pentathlon was born, and it quickly became celebrated as the ultimate examination of mind and body in Olympic sport. Coubertin's brainchild was introduced to the world in 1912, during the Olympic Summer Games in Stockholm, and to this day, the influence of Coubertin is visible and profound.

Right across the UIPM Sports movement, the values of our founder are conspicuous – honesty and fair play, tenacity and courage, honour and sportsmanship – and in 2018

UIPM decided to create a special day that would mark and celebrate Coubertin's legacy each year.

Pierre de Coubertin Pentathlon Day was born on September 9, 2018, during the Mixed Relay at the UIPM Pentathlon World Championships. A special ceremony was held in Mexico City (MEX) and the party was extended to all corners of the world thanks to the #High5 social media campaign (see below).

In 2019, as the International Olympic Committee celebrates its 125th anniversary, #PentathlonDay will again take place during the World Championships, held in Budapest (HUN), maintaining an important memorial for the founding father of a global sporting movement.
