MEDIA & TV COVERAGE

UIPM's live broadcast product continued its growth in the previous Olympic cycle, reaching record numbers of viewers around the world.

A peak of 275 broadcasted hours was reached during the UIPM 2019 Pentathlon World Cup Final in Tokyo (JPN), two years before Modern Pentathlon was due to return to the city for the biggest show of all: the Olympic Games.

The Laser Run event that brings Pentathlon competitions to a climax is always a compelling spectacle - and once again TV audiences around the world will experience the drama live during competitions that will be broadcast in 2021.

The new 90-minute programme will allow viewers to enjoy a full Modern Pentathlon from start to end. Signals are produced for semi-finals, finals

and Mixed Relay at all World Cup events, World Cup Final and the World Championships.

A 30-minute highlights package will also be available on UIPM TV, extending to 60 minutes for the Pentathlon World Cup Final and Pentathlon World Championships in Cairo (EGY).

At the end of all Category-A Pentathlon competition finals, a video news report (VNR) is delivered. These edits include interviews and footage from the day's action. Specific interviews and footage of certain athletes can be arranged on request. Media can submit their interest to media@pentathlon.org.

2021 IN REVIEW

After the COVID-19 pandemic caused havoc with the competition schedule the previous year, 2021 felt like a very welcome and familiar return to the frenetic, action-packed calendar of previous years as the best athletes across all age grades gathered again.

It was, of course, also an Olympic year with the delayed Tokyo Summer Games unquestionably the focus and deserving highlight of the season. A truly Great British double act lit up the Games with Tokyo proving to be historic for many reasons for the Modern Pentathlon community.

UIPM 2021 PENTATHLON WORLD CUP

MARCH 24-28

BUDAPEST (HUN)

Great Britain's **Kate French** gave signal of what would be a glorious year for her, taking gold with compatriot **Joanna Muir** (GBR) winning silver as **Gintare Venckauskaite** (LTU) claimed bronze.

Men's honours went to the impressive **Pavels Svecovs** (LAT) with **Ahmed Hamed** (EGY) taking silver and bronze claimed by **Patrick Dogue** (GER).

Joe Choong and **Olivia Green** rounded off a successful week for **Great Britain** with Mixed Relay gold, silver went to **Hungary** and Bronze to **South Korea**.

7-11 APRIL

SOFIA I (BUL)

As the sport continued to wrestle with lingering impacts of the COVID-19 pandemic, the Bulgarian capital of Sofia stepped up to host two legs of the World Cup on back to back weekends.

Korea's Jun Woongtae took an impressive gold in the Men's final narrowly ahead of **Robert Kasza** (HUN) and **Ilya Palazkov** (BLR) in third.

Women's honours went to **France** and **Marie Oteiza** with **Kate French** (GBR) a close second and **Anna Maliszewska** (POL) taking home bronze.

Relay gold went to **Kazakhstan** with **Belarus** and **Korea** filling out the podium places.

15-18 APRIL

SOFIA II (BUL)

When action resumed the following week in Sofia **Joseph Choong** resume Great Britain's blistering run of podium finishes as he took gold in the Men's final. **Ilya Palazkov** (BEL) went one better than the previous week as he took silver, swapping places with **Robert Kasza** (HUN) in third.

On the women's side, Hungary's **Michelle Gulyas** soared to an impressive gold medal with **Francesca Summers** becoming the third Great Briton female competitor to podium in 2021, taking silver. Belorussian veteran **Anastasiya Prokopenko** took bronze.

The three World Cups in 2021 combined with the one which took place in 2020 to help decide which 36 male and 36 female athletes made it to the World Cup final.

MAY 13-16

PENTATHLON WORLD CUP FINAL

The 2021 World Cup Final took place in **Szekesfehervar**, the Hungarian city stepping in when original venue Seoul (KOR) was unable to host due to COVID-19 complications.

Just two months out from the rearranged Tokyo Olympics, late qualification places for the Games ensured Szekesfehervar saw some frenetic action.

Germany's **Rebecca Langrer** set a new world record in the Fencing bonus round with 13 consecutive victories to get the Women's final off to a flyer. **Kate French** (GBR) laid down the ultimate Olympic marker by topping the podium, narrowly seeing off Germany's **Annika Schleu** for gold with **Michelle Gulyas** (HUN) winning bronze.

Valentin Prades (FRA) took the Men's title ahead of another British athlete climbing on to the podium with **Tom Toolis** (GBR) claiming silver and **Shuai Luo** (CHN) taking bronze.

After missing out on gold in the Women's final, **Schleu (GER)** had the consolation of team gold in the Mixed Relay alongside **Christian Zillekens**. **Belarus** and **Guatemala** also medaled.

JULY 12-18

JUNIOR WORLD CHAMPIONSHIPS

Two long years of waiting for the future of Modern Pentathlon to gather again came to an end in Alexandria in July.

Ahmed Elgendy (EGY) roared back to the top of the podium with a dominant Men's gold medal with Russia's **Egor Gromadskii** in second and **Csaba Bohm** (HUN) third. **Rebecca Castaudi** (FRA) claimed Women's gold for France with an all-European podium rounded out by **Alice Rinaudo** (ITA) and **Elzbieta Adomaityte** (LTU)

Relay joy was sprinkled across Europe with **Ukraine** (Men's), **Germany** (Women's) and **Belarus** (Mixed) all claiming gold medals.

September 13-19

YOUTH WORLD CHAMPIONSHIPS

Alexandria welcomed almost 130 athletes from 24 countries and **Amira Kandil** (EGY) was the toast of the home crowds as she claimed U19 Women's individual honours.

Europe dominated the other individual finals, **Hungary**, **Russia** and **Belarus** topping the podiums. **Kirill Manuilov** (RUS) was one of the week's most impressive competitors as he scorched to U19 Men's gold.

The same four countries would end up dominating the week as **Egypt** claimed two further U19 golds in Men's and Women's Relay while **Belarus** took U19 Mixed Relay and U17 Women's Relay titles with **Russia** and **Hungary** getting in on the act too.

JUNE 8-14

PENTATHLON WORLD CHAMPIONSHIPS

Cairo had again stepped in as an excellent host city and there were more performances to remember just weeks out from the rearranged Tokyo Olympics.

There was history for **Belarus** as the country claimed an record-equalling third-straight Women's title when the ageless **Anastasiya Prokopenko** claimed her second world gold in three years. **Elodie Clouvel** (FRA) was second with **Michelle Gulyas** (HUN) winning bronze.

If Prokopenko had proved class is permanent, Hungary's **Adam Marosi**, just weeks out from his 37th birthday, emphasized the fact winning Men's gold for his first world title since 2009. Victory earned him an automatic place in Tokyo. **Alexander Lifanov** (RMPF) and **Ahmed Elgendy** (EGY) claimed silver and bronze.

In the Mixed Relay gold, silver and bronze were claimed by **Korea** (**Seo(Kim)**, **Belarus** (**Palazkov/Prokopenko**) and **Germany** (**Dogue/Langrehr**) respectively.

AUGUST 5-7

TOKYO OLYMPIC GAMES

The rescheduled Tokyo Olympics will go down in history for many reasons and it will mark a seminal moment in the UIPM history books too. For the first time ever, an Olympic Games got to see the dynamic experience of the Pentathlon Stadium in all its glory. The Tokyo Stadium was transformed into a five-sports-in-one-venue paradise and it played host to more historic achievements.

Great Britain completed an unprecedented double as it took both gold medals on offer. Tokyo Stadium a field of dreams for both **Kate French** and **Joseph Choong**.

In an ultra-dramatic Women's final, it was French's nerve as much as her athletic excellence that sealed the defining moment of her career. French kept her cool in a chaotic Riding session and showed all of her class to make up a 15-second margin and race away to glory in the Laser Run. London 2012 gold medalist **Laura Asadauskaite** emerged from the pack to win silver and give **Lithuania** their first medal of the Olympics in any sport. **Sarolta Kovacs** of **Hungary** held on to bronze.

"I'm so pleased I could do it in Japan, I've had such a great experience here," said an emotional French.


A day later her countryman **Choong** set a new Olympic record of 1,482 points as he held off the chasing pack to complete a British double. But there was joy all across the podium.



Ahmed Elgendy of **Egypt** wrote his own fairytale, winning Olympic silver aged 21 as the first medalist from Africa. Bronze went to **Korea's Woongtae Jun** who gave Korea their first Olympic medal in the sport.

Tokyo also witnessed the resiliency of the UIPM and wider pentathlon community as the dramatic and difficult experiences in the Riding session of the Women's final sparked swift and significant reflection and remedy. Within days, the UIPM had introduced new measures to improve horse welfare in the sport.



HOW DOES IT WORK?

The PWR is the official list used to rank pentathletes. It includes the ranking points awarded to the pentathletes according to their three best placing in the official UIPM international competitions held during the preceding 12 months.

If during this 12-month period there are two competitions of the same type only the most recent will be included in the PWR.

There are PWR individual lists for Senior, Junior and Youth, for both genders and Relays.

Every pentathlete earns PWR points according to the level of the competition and his/her final place as specified in the PWR Point Table.

WHICH LEVEL OF COMPETITIONS EXIST?

There are four levels of competition.

Level 1:

Olympic Games, Pentathlon World Championships, Pentathlon World Cup Final. The winner gets 80 points. Following places earn points according to points table.

Level 2:

Continental Championships/Games, Pentathlon World Cups, CISM World Championships. The winner gets 60 points.

Level 3 and 4:

Regional Championships/Games and International World Ranking Competitions; depending on participation and strength they will be ranked as level 3 or 4 competitions. The winner gets 40 or 20 points, according to the level.

Apart from the Olympic Games and Youth Olympic Games, the highlight competitions for most pentathletes are the World Championships that take place annually for Senior, Junior (Under 21) and Youth (U19 / U17) male and female athletes, who compete in individual, team and relay events. The Youth World Championships (U19/U17) adopts the Tetrathlon format, which does not include Riding, and this competition returned with an exhilarating Junior World Championships in July 2021 in Alexandria (EGY).

The 2022 season will see the hugely exciting New Format used for the first time. This format, designed especially for the Paris 2024 Olympic Games adds tension and drama at every step with an elimination format in qualifications and semi-finals to leave just 18 athletes standing for the Final, which will feature all five disciplines in a breathtaking 90-minute showcase of the best all-round athletes on the planet.

Individual medals are awarded along with team medals, which are decided by adding the top three ranked team members' scores. The relays consist

of up to 18 24 teams of two athletes, competing in a continuous relay across all five disciplines.

Relays are an exciting spectacle requiring contribution from both team members in every event, and the climax of all World Championships and Pentathlon World Cups is the Mixed Relay, where men and women have competed in unison since 2009.

The Men's and Women's Relays only take place at World and Continental Pentathlon Championships.

UIPM PENTATHLON WORLD CUP

A World Cup series for men and women was launched in 1990 and renamed the Pentathlon World Cup in 2018. Each year there are a number of World Cup competitions in different countries, culminating in a World Cup Final. The best 36 athletes qualify for the World Cup Final via a ranking list using the three best results of each athlete at the four World Cups in the same season.



TETRATHLON

(FENCE-SWIM-RUN-SHOOT)

It is, to all intents and purposes, Pentathlon without the horses. Tetrathlon has become a vital part of the UIPM portfolio because it combines Fencing, Swimming and Laser Run and is therefore the perfect audition for our ultimate five-sport test.

Tetrathlon is now the favoured format for many important events including the Youth Olympic Games (YOG), University competitions and the Masters circuit. It is also used for Under 19 and Under 17 competitions, allowing athletes to qualify for YOG.

A New Tetrathlon format proposed for the Dakar 2026 Youth Olympic Games has proved to be a huge success.

TRIATHLE (SHOOT-SWIM-RUN)

Through Triathle, the UIPM has established a platform to encourage young athletes to practise Pentathlon starting from the basic disciplines of Running and Swimming and then progressing into Shooting to eventually become full pentathletes.

Triathle begins normally with a pack start of runners for the first 25m, followed by athletes competing in the first of multiple shooting series of five shots each, prior to approaching the transition area and then swimming before running the final leg to the finish line.

It was introduced in 2012 and is designed as a Beach Games sport. In 2019 it featured alongside Laser Run in the Asian Beach Games in Manila (PHI).

The UIPM 2022 Biathle-Triathle World Championships are set to be held in Machico in Madeira, Portugal.



BIATHLE (RUN-SWIM-RUN)

Biathle was established in Monaco in 1999. Through Biathle the UIPM has established a competition comprising of two fundamental components of Modern Pentathlon and represent the most practised sports in the world – running and swimming.

Like Triathle, it lends itself perfectly to a Beach Games environment and there is an annual UIPM Biathle/Triathle World Championships and Biathle/Triathle National Tour.

Biathle begins with a pack start of runners who complete half of the total running distance before entering a 50m transition area. Athletes then dive into water and swim the required distance before exiting the water, putting on their shoes and running the second leg to the finish line.

The Biathle-Triathle National Tour was among the first competitions to be restarted in 2021 with events in Egypt, Portugal, Georgia, Germany, Burkina Faso, the Philippines and South Africa as the Biathle-Triathle National Tour continues to grow.



LASER RUN (SHOOT-RUN)

Laser Run, the fastest-growing of all UIPM Sports, was launched in 2014 to increase international interest in the movement and give more athletes an entry point and a pathway to Pentathlon.

It enables all athletes in the world to overcome difficulties in terms of access to new technologies, systems and equipment which might be a barrier to many sporting careers. Laser Run consists of laps of a running circuit and rounds of laser shooting and can take place in various environments including cross-country, track, urban centres, indoor arenas and beaches. Its 'plug and play' approach, ease of installation and the uniqueness of the concept has facilitated its rapid growth in recent years through the highly successful UIPM Global Laser Run City Tour.

While there was 14 months of inactivity during the Pandemic, the GLRCT was back with a bang in 2021 with dozens of events across over more than 20 countries.



WORLD SCHOOLS BIATHLON (SWIM-RUN)

In 2005 UIPM launched a new competition linked to the success of Biathlon. The event consists of Swimming (in a 25m or 50m pool) and Running (preferably on a standardized track although it can also be carried out on a flat surface if extra care is taken so that the distances are correct). Swimming takes place first and the Running begins with a mass start. The final result is the sum of the total points.

The success and originality of the World Schools Biathlon is that schools take part in this international competition by entering their results in a global database using the UIPM website (www.pentathlon.org) directly from their location.



MASTERS

(MODERN PENTATHLON)

Members of the UIPM Masters community take part regularly in competitions around the world, including the UIPM Masters World Championships, continental and multi-lateral gatherings.

By keeping in touch with Modern Pentathlon, the Masters athletes — many of them former elite pentathletes — contribute to the development of the sport while staying competition-fit and connected to their fellow veteran athletes.

There are two formats in Masters competitions, Modern Pentathlon and Tetrathlon, and many of the athletes also compete in categories from 40+ to 70+ in the UIPM World Championships in Laser Run and Biathlon-Triathlon.

The UIPM Pentathlon Masters World Championships will return to the calendar in 2022 after suffering disruptions in the wake of the COVID-19 pandemic.

PARA PENTATHLON

(inc. PARA LASER RUN)

The UIPM Para Sports movement began with the formation of a Para Pentathlon Working Group and through UIPM's membership of the International Paralympic Committee (IPC).

Since then the movement has flourished, with many disabled athletes in numerous countries receiving support to practise Para Laser Run and other disciplines of Para Pentathlon.

UIPM has stated its ambition for Para Pentathlon to become part of the Paralympic Games in future, offering disabled athletes the same opportunity as able-bodied athletes to experience the ultimate test of mind and body.

Many National Federations have demonstrated their commitment to inclusion by identifying athletes and finding pathways for them with the help of UIPM's support team

PARTNERSHIPS

UNIVERSITY SPORT

UIPM has a partnership with FISU, the governing body for university sport, which gives students around the world the opportunity to compete with one another at the FISU University World Modern Pentathlon Championships.

The first instalment of the competition took place in Budapest (HUN) in 2018, attracting high-quality pentathletes from 18 nations across five continents.

Egypt won a medal in all three categories, including a silver for **Ahmed Elgendy (EGY)**. The second instalment of the championships had been due to take place in Vila Real, Portugal in 2020 but were cancelled due to the COVID-19 pandemic.

Instead, the next generation of gifted student athletes will compete at the 2022 FISU World University Modern Pentathlon Championship in Buenos Aires, Argentina in September.

MILITARY SPORT

Modern Pentathlon has always had strong connections to the military and many Olympic and world champions have been serving in the military, most famously General George Smith Patton (USA), who competed in Stockholm 1912.

UIPM has a strong relationship with CISM, the governing body for military sport, and many of the world's elite pentathletes take part in the CISM Military World Championships and CISM Military World Games. These are Category 1 Modern Pentathlon competitions.

The CISM Military World Championships returned in September of 2021 to Drzonkow, Poland. The host nation were in a hurry as **Poland** took both gold medals on the opening day as Tokyo 2020 Olympians **Lukasz Gutkowski** and **Sebastian Stasiak** took Men's relay gold while **Anna Maliszewska** and **Oktawia Nowacka** took Women's Relay honours.

Men's individual champion was **Bence Demeter** of Hungary while **Gulnaz Gubaydullina** (RUS) claimed the Women's title. **Ukraine** claimed Mixed Relay gold



MODERN PENTATHLON TIMELINE

Modern Pentathlon is a unique multi-discipline sport created by the founder of the modern Olympic movement, Baron Pierre de Coubertin, that combines mental and physical challenge to find the most complete athlete. It evolved from the Ancient Pentathlon and was introduced at the Stockholm 1912 Olympic Games. It

was Coubertin's belief that the event would "test a man's moral qualities as much as his physical resources and skills, producing thereby the ideal, complete athlete". Now gender-equal, the sport has evolved considerably, with modern concepts and technology improving the sport and the spectator experience.

HIGHLIGHTS, HEROES & RECORDS

1950s
MEN



UIPM was formed in 1948, during the London Olympics where Wille Grut (SWE) won gold to complete an unusual double (he also won silver in the 1948 Olympic Winter Games in Saint Moritz). Sweden continued to dominate, with several world titles and consecutive Olympic gold medals for Lars Hall in 1952 and 1956. Hall was the first pentathlete to win individual Olympic and world gold. But all the time athletes from the USSR, Konstantin Salnikov and especially Igor Novikov, were starting to get stronger...

1960s
MEN



Former Soviet Union (URSS) and Hungary were the dominant nations, winning all team gold medals at Olympic Games and World Championships. Igor Novikov, and then especially Andras Balczo (winning individual Olympic and several individual World Championships gold) from Hungary were the outstanding athletes, with Ferenc Török and Ferenc Nemeth winning Olympic gold as well.

1970s
MEN



After Andras Balczo was crowned as Olympic champion in 1972, he was succeeded by Janusz Peciak from Poland in 1976. He became the best athlete of this era, together with Pavel Lednev, four times individual world champion from the USSR. Poland was the only nation to break the USSR and Hungarian phalanx, by clinching several World Championships team titles. The only other athlete winning individual gold at a World Championships during this time was Bob Nieman from USA in 1979.

1980s
MEN



Whereas Poland (with Peciak and his teammates), Soviet Union (with Anatoli Starostin, World Championships and Olympic Champion) and Hungary (with a new, young team) kept winning, Italy became a strong nation, winning team gold in 1986, Olympic medals and individual World Championships titles with Daniele Masala and Carlo Massullo. By the end of the decade, all of the new Hungarian team comprised of Attila Mizser, Laszlo Fabian and Janos Martinek had won individual gold at either World Championships or Olympic Games and several team gold medals. Starostin, Peciak and Masala all won individual Olympic gold and individual World Championships gold.

WOMEN



In the early years of women's Modern Pentathlon the dominant athletes were Irina Kiseleva and Barbara Kotowska (USSR) and Dorota Idzi (POL). But Sabine Krapf (GER), Eva Fjellerup (DAN) and the British team, well represented by Wendy Norman, and the French started to compete strongly. The first Women's World Championships took place in 1981 (individual + relay). Great Britain had a golden generation with Kathy Taylor and Sarah Parker winning a lot of team events.



Poland had strong individual athletes with Arkadiusz Skrzypaszek winning individual gold at the Olympics (1992) and World Championships (1991). Besides Hungary, Poland and USSR being strong teams the French became a strong Pentathlon nation. It started with Joel Bouzou winning individual World Championships gold in 1987, followed by team gold in 1994, and finally Sebastian Deleigne becoming a double individual world champion (1997/1998). The Russian athlete Dmitry Svatkovsky also won consecutive individual World Championships gold in 1994 and 1995.




Whereas Poland remained the dominant team and Italy was an emerging force, Eva Fjellerup from Denmark was the woman to catch as she won individual World Championships gold four times. Hungary, Germany, Italy, Russia and Belarus had very successful women athletes during this time as well.



Dmitry Svatkovsky completed his medal collection by winning individual Olympic gold in 2000 and leading a new Russian generation to several world titles. Andrey Moiseev became double Olympic champion (2004 and 2008). Besides established nations, new countries, such as Lithuania (Andrejus Zadneprovskis, Edvinas Krungolcas), Czech Republic (Michal Sedlecky) and also Germany (Eric Walther) had athletes winning World Championships and also Olympic medals. It was also the decade when Asian countries, led by South Korea and China, started to become strong contenders, especially with Zhenhua Qian winning individual World Championships gold in 2005.



Great Britain grew in strength, winning team and individual world titles and also gold and bronze at the first Olympic Games to feature women's pentathlon in 2000. Stephanie Cook (GBR), Zsuzsanna Vörös from Hungary and Lena Schoeneborn of Germany all won individual gold at World Championships and the Olympic Games. Amélie Caze from France enjoyed a remarkable period of dominance, winning the World Championships three times, while Schoeneborn (GER) became the youngest of the first three women's Olympic champions when she claimed gold in Beijing 2008 aged just 22.



At London 2012, David Svoboda emerged to take gold for the Czech Republic for the first time. Cao Zhongrong (silver) won China's first Olympic medal while 2009 world champion Adam Marosi (HUN) took bronze. In Rio de Janeiro four years later, Alexander Lesun (RUS) became champion after a strong and unflappable performance that gave no chance to the rest of the field. Pavlo Tymoshchenko (UKR) won silver and Ismael Hernandez Uscanga (MEX) won a sprint to the line for bronze.



Following the success of Schoeneborn (GER) in Beijing, Laura Asadauskaite from Lithuania nailed the victory in London 2012 with Samantha Murray (GBR, silver) and Yane Marques (BRA, bronze) joining her on the podium. However, the 2008 and 2012 champions were both eliminated during Riding at Rio 2016 and Chloe Esposito (AUS) engineered a stunning triumph. She was joined on the podium by Elodie Couvel (FRA, silver) and Oktawia Nowacka (POL, bronze).
















THE LEGACY OF COUBERTIN

Not long after the dawn of the 20th century, a French visionary named Baron Pierre de Coubertin had the idea to create a new sport linked to the philosophy of Pentathlon at the ancient Olympic Games - especially for the Modern Olympic Games he had recently established.

The Modern Pentathlon soon became celebrated as the ultimate examination of mind and body in Olympic sport. Coubertin's concept was introduced to the world at the Olympic Summer Games Stockholm 1912, and to this day, the influence of Coubertin is visible and profound.

Right across the UIPM Sports movement, the values of our founder are conspicuous - honesty and fair play, tenacity and courage, honour and sportsmanship - and in 2018

UIPM decided to establish a special day that would mark and celebrate Coubertin's legacy each year. The 1st Pierre de Coubertin Pentathlon Day was held on September 9, 2018. A special ceremony was arranged in Mexico City (MEX) during the UIPM Pentathlon World Championships and the party was extended to all corners of the world.

In 2021 the 4th annual Pierre de Coubertin Pentathlon Day was marked by another hugely successful social media #High5 campaign where leading athletes in the sport were encouraged to share photos of themselves doing a #High5 in a show of solidarity with the five disciplines of their great sport - and its visionary founder.
