We hope to see more opportunities worldwide to take part in UIPM Sports as the pandemic situation eases with the help of medical science.



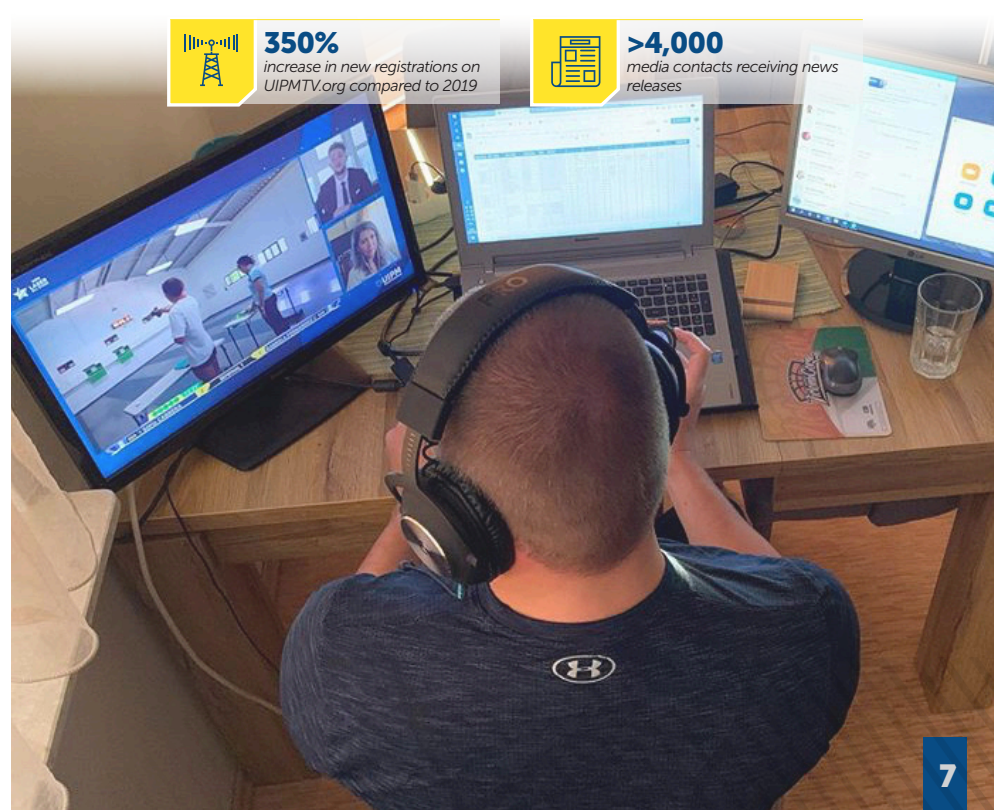

ROAD TO TOKYO

With the rescheduled Tokyo 2020 Olympic Games looming ever nearer on the horizon, hundreds of the world's leading pentathletes will be striving throughout the 2021 UIPM season for the performances they need to qualify.

With only two ranking competitions taking place in 2020, a largely fallow season was endured as athletes joined the rest of the world in living with the restrictions resulting from the COVID-19 Coronavirus pandemic.

With 46 quota places allocated so far, and 72 in total up for grabs, there are still several ways for the world's most versatile athletes to reach their coveted destination – and all remaining qualification competitions are scheduled to take place according to UIPM's COVID-19 guidelines.

Six automatic places (three each for women and men) will be on offer during the seasonal showpiece – the UIPM 2021 Pentathlon World Championships – taking place in Cairo (EGY) from June 7-13.

Japan, as Olympic host nation, will be guaranteed at least one place per gender, and two places per gender

will be reserved for the Tripartite Commission, which has the right to allocate berths by invitation to National Olympic Committees (NOCs) that applied before the deadline of 17 January, 2020.

At present that leaves 14 places to be earned by right, and this will be where the key battleground takes place in 2021. The UIPM Olympic World Ranking List will be closely monitored throughout the elite season as athletes vie for position, hoping to secure one of the available places for female and male athletes when the final list is published on 14 June. Ranking points will be available at all stages of the UIPM 2021 Pentathlon World Cup, while contingencies are in place in case of any cancellations.

In June 2021, the process of selection will be formalised as NOCs and National Federations are officially informed of the number of quota places they have earned, with the option of handing any or all of them back, leading to a reallocation according to the ranking list. July 5, 2021 is the deadline for all entries.

In 2019, 46 athletes secured quota places on behalf of their nations and

the majority of those athletes will be on the start line at the Tokyo Stadium (see below).

The first to qualify were African champions Haydy Morsy and Sherif Nazeir (EGY), followed by UIPM 2019 World Cup Final gold medallists Laura Asadauskaite (LTU) and Joseph Choong (GBR).

Athletes from USA, Mexico, Chile, Guatemala, Cuba, Brazil, Ecuador and Argentina secured places through their performances at the Pan American Games in Lima (PER), before the European Championships in Bath (GBR) provided moments of joy for athletes from Great Britain, France, Belarus, Germany, Ireland, Lithuania, Russia, Hungary, Czech Republic and Poland.

At the UIPM 2019 Pentathlon World Championships in Budapest (HUN), champions Volha Silkina (BLR) and Valentin Belaud (FRA) claimed quota

places along with Elena Micheli (ITA) and Woongtae Jun (KOR).

As there were two individual medallists from Great Britain (Kate French and Joseph Choong) who had already secured quota places via the European Championships, those places went back into the pot to be decided according to the OWR. Should this situation recur during the UIPM 2021 Pentathlon World Championships, any 'double bookings' would result in quota places again being redirected.

The final quota places claimed during the 2019 season came at the Asia/Oceania Championships and Olympic Qualifier, where athletes from Korea, Japan, China, Uzbekistan, Kazakhstan and Australia took a step closer to realising their Olympic dreams.

MEDIA & TV COVERAGE

UIPM's live broadcast product continued its growth in 2019, reaching record numbers of viewers around the world.

A peak of 275 broadcasted hours was reached during the UIPM 2019 Pentathlon World Cup Final in Tokyo (JPN), a year before Modern Pentathlon was due to return to the city for the biggest show of all: the Olympic Games (now rescheduled to take place in 2021).

The Laser Run event that brings Pentathlon competitions to a climax is always a compelling spectacle - and once again TV audiences around the world will experience the drama live during competitions that will be broadcast in 2021.

The 90-minute programme features 45 minutes of highlights from Swimming, Fencing and Riding and 45 minutes of

live footage from Laser Run and the award ceremony.

Over at UIPM TV (uipmtv.org), online viewers can watch a live stream that also includes the disciplines of Riding and, in the Pentathlon World Cup Final and Pentathlon World Championships, Swimming.

A 30-minute highlights package will also be available on UIPM TV, extending to 60 minutes for the Pentathlon World Cup Final and Pentathlon World Championships in Cairo (EGY).

At the end of all Category-A Pentathlon competition finals, a video news report (VNR) is delivered. These edits include interviews and footage from the day's action. Specific interviews and footage of certain athletes can be arranged on request. Media can submit their interest to media@pentathlon.org.

UIPM 2020 PENTATHLON WORLD CUP

FEB 27 - MAR 3

CAIRO (EGY)

Adam Marosi (HUN) won his first individual gold medal in six years after a vintage performance. **Jun Woongtae (KOR)** claimed silver and **Arthur Lanigan-O’Keeffe (IRL)** won a thrilling race to the line to capture bronze.

Joanna Muir (GBR) won a thrilling Women’s Final ahead of silver and bronze medallists **Uliana Batashova** and **Gulnaz Gubaydullina (RUS)**.

Host nation **Egypt** won the Mixed Relay for the second successive year thanks to a great team effort by **Haydy Morsy** and **Eslam Hamad**, with **Korea** winning the silver medal and **Guatemala** bronze.

#LASERHOMERUN

“From Ecuador to Singapore,” as commentator James Tzanoudakis said during the live broadcast of the Finals on UIPMTV, the world came together for the first-ever virtual Laser Run in May 2020. The aim of #LaserHomeRun was to unite the global UIPM Sports community during the initial pandemic lockdown, enabling participants of all ages to add focus to their home training regimes, keep their skills sharp and enjoy the thrill of online competition. More than 600 entrants from an initial registration of 800+ ended up participating, from Olympians and world medallists to the planet’s youngest Laser Run athletes.



#LASERALLSTARS

Twenty-four athletes from five continents – including three from the same family – became the first UIPM Laser All Stars medallists after a thrilling day of virtual competition. On the 3rd Pierre de Coubertin Pentathlon Day, September 9, Egypt topped the inaugural #LaserAllStars medal table with four gold medals along with two silver and two bronze, while Great Britain scooped seven medals including two golds. There were also medals for athletes from Mexico, Russia and Guatemala as well as Ecuador, the Philippines, Afghanistan, Switzerland and Moldova.

2019 IN REVIEW

A major feature of the 2019 Modern Pentathlon season was the race to secure automatic qualification for the Tokyo 2020 Olympic Games. Many athletes secured a quota place for their nations at the continental championships, while others like Valentin Belaud (FRA), above, did so on the higher ground of the UIPM 2019 Pentathlon World Championships. In this section you can read a summary of the elite competitions as well as the Junior and Youth World Championships.

UIPM 2019 PENTATHLON WORLD CUP

FEB 27 - MAR 3

CAIRO (EGY)

Ahmed Elgendy (EGY) continued his remarkable run of success from 2018 by claiming his first senior gold medal in front of a home crowd. **Jan Kuf (CZE)** claimed silver and **Justinas Kinderis (LTU)** took bronze.

Uliana Batashova (RUS) won a dramatic Women's Final ahead of silver medallist **Natalya Coyle (IRL)** and **Sarolta Kovacs (HUN)**, who claimed bronze.

Elgendy (EGY) teamed up with **Haydy Morsy (EGY)** to give the host nation another gold medal in the Mixed Relay ahead of fellow medallists **Czech Republic** and **Hungary**.

APR 10-14

SOFIA (BUL)

Marie Oteiza (FRA) mastered rainy conditions to win the Women's Final ahead of silver medallist **Laura Asadauskaite (LTU)**, with bronze going to **Alice Sotero (ITA)**.

Manuel Padilla (MEX) was a surprise winner of the Men's Final. He was joined on the podium by **Joseph Choong (GBR)**, who beat **Fabian Liebig (GER)** in a sprint finish for silver.

Poland (Marta Kobecka / Jaroslaw Swiderski) enjoyed a fine victory in the Mixed Relay over fellow medallists **Great Britain** and **Germany**.

MAY 3-7

SZEKESFEHERVAR (HUN)

An emotional Women's Final was won by local **Tamara Alekszejev (HUN)**, while **Ilke Ozyuksel (TUR)** claimed silver a week after losing her father. Bronze went to **Anna Buriak (RUS)**.

Christian Zillekens (GER) triumphed over a high-class field in the Men's Final, consigning **Valentin Prades (FRA)** to silver and **Ahmed Elgendy (EGY)** to bronze.

China (Yufei Bian / Jiahao Han) defied wet and windy conditions to win an excellent Mixed Relay ahead of **Hungary** and **Lithuania**.

MAY 22-26

PRAGUE (CZE)

The Rio 2016 Olympic champion, **Aleksander Lesun (RUS)**, announced his return to form with a dominant gold medal in the Men's Final. Behind him a sprint finish ended with silver for **Joseph Choong (GBR)** and bronze for **Marvin Dogue (GER)**.

Kate French (GBR) tasted World Cup gold for the third year in succession and she was joined by team-mate **Jessica Varley (GBR)** on the podium. **Gulnaz Gubaydullina (RUS)** split the British duo with silver.

Great Britain (Joanna Muir / Samuel Curry) won the Mixed Relay ahead of **Germany** and **Egypt**.

TOKYO (JPN) JUNE 27-29

PENTATHLON WORLD CUP FINAL

Laura Asadauskaite (LTU) and **Joseph Choong (GBR)** became the first athletes to secure qualification for Tokyo 2020 from a UIPM competition by winning gold at the UIPM 2020 Pentathlon World Cup Final and Olympic Test Event in **Tokyo (JPN)**.

In the Women's Final, 35-year-old London 2012 Olympic champion Asadauskaite (LTU) fought off stiff competition from silver medallist Elodie Clouvel (FRA) and Annika Schleu (GER), who claimed bronze.

The Men's Final continued a thrilling rivalry that had developed during the season between Choong (GBR) and **Marvin Dogue (GER)**, who led the race before being passed by his rival on the final straight. Dogue (GER) took home the silver as **Shuhuan Li (CHN)** claimed a surprise bronze to complete a trio of under-25 athletes on the podium.

Asadauskaite (LTU) and Choong (GBR) joined African champions Haydy Morsy and Sherif Nazeir (EGY) on the list of Tokyo 2020 qualifiers.

Having finished 2nd and 4th in their respective individual finals, **Elodie Clouvel** and **Valentin Prades** teamed up to win Mixed Relay gold for **France** on the final day.

Two-time winners **Ireland (Natalya Coyle / Arthur Lanigan O'Keeffe)** pushed them close and won silver as **Lithuania (Gintare Venckauskaite / Justinas Kinderis)** snatched bronze.

DRZONKOW (POL) JUL 7-13

JUNIOR WORLD CHAMPIONSHIPS

The UIPM Junior World Championship is often a reliable indicator of who will become the Pentathlon superstars of tomorrow, and **Adelina Ibatullina** and **Kseniia Fraltsova (RUS)** were the starlets of 2019 with three medals apiece.

Ahmed Elgendy (EGY) went home with a gold and a silver medal after his breakthrough success of 2018 in Kladno (CZE), while his fellow 2018 Youth Olympic Games champion **Salma Abdelmaksoud (EGY)** finished with the same return.

In the final analysis, **Russia** topped the medals table with four golds and a silver, while **Egypt** won two golds and two silvers and **Great Britain** claimed two silvers and two bronzes.

SOFIA (BUL) JUL 18-24

YOUTH WORLD CHAMPIONSHIPS

The UIPM Under 19 and Under 17 World Championships were combined for the first time in Sofia (BUL).

Russia finished with the most medals across the two age groups – eight, including three golds – while **Egypt** managed one silver and bronze alongside their five golds.

The U19 Women's Individual gold was claimed by **Kseniya Klimiankova (BLR)** while **Ivan Shalupin (RUS)** won the Men's Individual title.

BUDAPEST (HUN) SEP 2-9

PENTATHLON WORLD CHAMPIONSHIPS

The Pentathlon and Laser Run World Championships were combined for the first time in the Pentathlon Stadium in **Budapest (HUN)**, drawing a record entry for a UIPM competition. Four athletes secured qualification for the Tokyo 2020 Olympic Games at the climax of seven breathless days.

Mexico (Mariana Arceo & Mayan Oliver) kicked off by winning gold in the Women's Relay ahead of **Hungary** and **Korea**. **Germany (Patrick Dogue & Alexander Nobis)** prevailed in a high-class Men's Relay ahead of silver medallists **Korea**

and bronze medallists **Russia**. There was a second consecutive Women's Individual world title for **Belarus** as **Volha Silkina** enjoyed a surprise victory and added team gold with 2018 champion **Anastasiya Prokopenko** and **Iryna Prasiantsova** (below). Individual silver went to **Elena Micheli (ITA)** and bronze to **Kate French (GBR)**.

The second coming of **Valentin Belaud (FRA)** was the story of the Men's Individual Final. The 2016 champion added his second world title ahead of **Joseph Choong (GBR)** and bronze medallist **Woongtae Jun (KOR)**, who led his country to team gold.

Egypt (Salma Abdelmaksoud & Eslam Hamad) signed off with Mixed Relay gold ahead of **France** and **Belarus**.



2019 UIPM AWARDS

Elodie Clouvel of France and Joseph Choong of Great Britain won the top prizes of Best Female and Male Pentathlete respectively at the UIPM 2019 Annual Awards Gala Dinner in Budapest on September 7.

Ahmed Elgendy of Egypt won the Best Junior Male Pentathlete for the second year in succession, while the Best Junior Female award went to Rebecca Langrehr of Germany.

All four of the individual athlete awards were subject to an online public vote. There were Development Awards for Thailand and Peru and a Best Contribution for experienced UIPM technical delegate and coach Bernhard Petruschinski (GER).

UIPM's Honorary President, HSH Prince Albert II of Monaco, was inducted into the UIPM Hall of Fame and received his certificate before making a speech.

UNDERSTANDING PENTATHLON

SWIMMING



The Swimming event is a 200m freestyle race. The heats are seeded according to each swimmer's personal best time, with the fastest swimmers competing in the final heat.

A time of 2min 30sec is worth 250 pentathlon points and one point is added to an athlete's score for each 0.5sec they can swim faster than this time. Similarly, one point is deducted from an athlete's score for each 0.5sec exceeding 2:30.00. For example, a time of 2:29.50 will result in a score of 251. A time of 2:30.50 will result in a score of 249.

The value of Swimming scoring in Modern Pentathlon was adjusted from 3 points per second to 2 points per second at the 68th UIPM Congress in Frankfurt (GER) in 2016. The move was designed to stimulate the development of pentathletes in nations where Swimming facilities are not up to international standards.

FENCING



Pentathletes take part in épée fencing, competing against all other athletes in a Ranking Round, needing just one hit within one minute to win. If neither fencer has scored a hit after 60sec they both register a defeat. An athlete who wins 25 of their 35 bouts will get 250 pentathlon points, with each victory or defeat above or below this number worth a plus or minus score of six points.

Since 2015 UIPM has added a new, dynamic and spectator-friendly element to Fencing. Competitions now include a Bonus Round, which allows athletes to add to their score by winning elimination bouts on a showpiece piste. Each bout lasts 30sec and the event takes place on a stage on the same field of play as the Riding and Laser Run.

The pentathletes' points from the Ranking Round are taken over to the final round. The competition is carried out in reverse order, with the last-place athlete going first against the next-placed athlete. The winner of each bout will be matched against the next best-ranked pentathlete. In this way, a pentathlete may continue to advance as long as they continue to win matches. Athletes receive one bonus point for each bout they win.

RIDING



In the Riding event, athletes have to complete a show jumping course that is between 400m and 450m including 12 obstacles and 15 jumps, in a set time.

The horses are assigned randomly and each athlete only has 20 minutes and five practice jumps to get to know the horse in the warm-up ring, before coming out to compete.

A clear round within the time allowed is worth 300 pentathlon points. Competitors lose seven points for each jump they knock down, and 10 points for a refusal to jump or a fall, which is equivalent to a 10sec handicap in the Laser Run. They also lose one point for each second they are over the allowed time.

It is mandatory to cross the final line, otherwise the rider will be eliminated with zero points for Riding.

LASER RUN



The climax of the pentathlon is a combined running and shooting event. Athletes start with a handicap according to their points tally and run four 800m circuits interspersed with four rounds of laser shooting where they must hit five targets at range of 10m.

Athletes can start running the next 800m leg once they have hit the target five times. If they take longer than 50sec they are allowed to continue, but any hopes of a medal will have gone.

The competitor who has amassed the most points in the first three disciplines starts the Laser Run first, and the handicap system ensures that the first person to cross the finish line wins the gold medal. The terminology of this discipline was changed from Combined Event to Laser Run in 2016.

HOW DOES IT WORK?

The PWR is the official list used to rank pentathletes. It includes the ranking points awarded to the pentathletes according to their three best placing in the official UIPM international competitions held during the preceding 12 months.

If during this 12-month period there are two competitions of the same type only the most recent will be included in the PWR.

There are PWR individual lists for Senior, Junior and Youth, for both genders and Relays.

Every pentathlete earns PWR points according to the level of the competition and his/her final place as specified in the PWR Point Table.

WHICH LEVEL OF COMPETITIONS EXIST?

There are four levels of competition.

Level 1:
Olympic Games, Pentathlon World Championships, Pentathlon World Cup Final. The winner gets 80 points. Following places earn points according to points table.

Level 2:
Continental Championships/Games, Pentathlon World Cups, CISM World Championships. The winner gets 60 points.

Level 3 and 4:
Regional Championships/Games and International World Ranking Competitions; depending on participation and strength they will be ranked as level 3 or 4 competitions. The winner gets 40 or 20 points, according to the level.

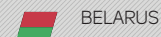

HOW IT WORKS

Viewers and spectators watching Modern Pentathlon at the Paris 2024 Olympic Games can expect to see a compelling showpiece featuring all five disciplines in 90 minutes.

The new format features an elimination system that results in only 12 female and 12 male athletes qualifying for the Final.

During the compelling, TV-friendly showpiece, those 12 athletes will compete in Riding (20mins), a Fencing Bonus Round (15mins), Swimming (10mins) and finally Laser Run (15mins) to decide the Olympic champion.

The vision for 2024 is designed to make Modern Pentathlon shorter, faster, more connected and compact and easier to understand for all audiences.

As a sustainable and cost-effective model for the future of Modern Pentathlon within the Olympic Games, the proposal is also compatible with the IOC's Olympic Agenda 2020 and New Norm reforms.

UIPM President Dr Klaus Schormann said: "The new Olympic Games format will dramatically improve the experience of viewers and spectators while retaining the essence of the sport."

GRAND OPENING DAY

HSH Prince Albert II of Monaco, UIPM's Honorary President, officially opened the federation's new Headquarters in the Principality on November 30, 2020.

OUR COMPETITIONS

MODERN PENTATHLON AND OTHER UIPM SPORTS

UIPM WORLD CHAMPIONSHIPS

Apart from the Olympic Games and Youth Olympic Games, the highlight competitions for most pentathletes are the World Championships that take place annually for Senior, Junior (Under 21) and Youth (U19 / U17) male and female athletes, who compete in individual, team and relay events. The Youth World Championships (U19/ U17) adopts the Tetrathlon format, which does not include Riding, and this competition is scheduled to return with the Junior World Championships in July 2021 in Alexandria (EGY).

Athletes qualify for the Final via qualification groups of up to 38 athletes per group. So, in the case of three groups, the top 10 placed athletes qualify directly from each group, with the next best six athletes from all groups rounding out the field. The athletes then compete in a Final with the best 36 competitors from these qualifiers. Individual medals are awarded along with team medals, which are decided by adding the top three team members' scores. The relays consist of up to 24 teams of two athletes, competing in a continuous relay across all five disciplines in one day. Each team member swims

100m, fences one opponent, rides a horse over nine obstacles and ends with Laser Run (two shooting series and two 800m runs). Relays are an exciting spectacle requiring contribution from both team members in every event, and the climax of all World Championships and Pentathlon World Cups is the Mixed Relay, where men and women have competed in unison since 2009. The Men's and Women's Relays only take place at World and Continental Pentathlon Championships.

UIPM PENTATHLON WORLD CUP

A World Cup series for men and women was launched in 1990 and renamed the Pentathlon World Cup in 2018. Each year there are a number of World Cup competitions in different countries, culminating in a World Cup Final. The best 36 athletes qualify for the World Cup Final via a ranking list using the three best results of each athlete at the four World Cups.

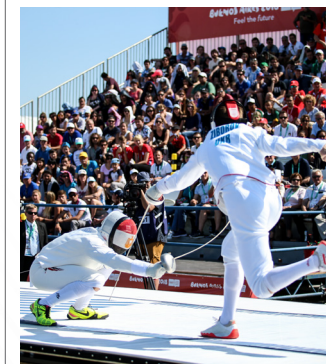


TETRATHLON (FENCE-SWIM-RUN-SHOOT)

It is, to all intents and purposes, Pentathlon without the horses. Tetrathlon has become a vital part of the UIPM portfolio because it combines Fencing, Swimming and Laser Run and is therefore the perfect audition for our ultimate five-sport test.

Tetrathlon is now the favoured format for many important events including the Youth Olympic Games (YOG), University competitions and the Masters circuit. It is also used for Under 19 and Under 17 competitions, allowing athletes to qualify for YOG.

A New Tetrathlon format proposed for the Dakar 2026 Youth Olympic Games was tested several times in 2019.



TRIATHLE
(SHOOT-SWIM-RUN)

Through Triathle, the UIPM has established a platform to encourage young athletes to practise Pentathlon starting from the basic disciplines of Running and Swimming and then progressing into Shooting to eventually become full pentathletes.

Triathle begins normally with a pack start of runners for the first 25m, followed by athletes competing in the first of multiple shooting series of five shots each, prior to approaching the transition area and then swimming before running the final leg to the finish line.

It was introduced in 2012 and is designed as a Beach Games sport. In 2019 it featured alongside Laser Run in the Asian Beach Games in Manila (PHI).



BIATHLE
(RUN-SWIM-RUN)

Biathle was established in Monaco in 1999. Through Biathle the UIPM has established a competition comprising of two fundamental components of Modern Pentathlon and represent the most practised sports in the world – running and swimming.

Like Triathle, it lends itself perfectly to a Beach Games environment and there is an annual UIPM Biathle/Triathle World Championships and Biathle/Triathle National Tour.

Biathle begins with a pack start of runners who complete half of the total running distance before entering a 50m transition area. Athletes then dive into water and swim the required distance before exiting the water, putting on their shoes and running the second leg to the finish line.



LASER RUN
(SHOOT-RUN)

Laser Run, the fastest-growing of all UIPM Sports, was launched in 2014 to increase international interest in the movement and give more athletes an entry point and a pathway to Pentathlon. It enables all athletes in the world to overcome difficulties in terms of access to new technologies, systems and equipment which might be a barrier to many sporting careers.

Laser Run consists of laps of a running circuit and rounds of laser shooting and can take place in various environments including cross-country, track, urban centres, indoor arenas and beaches. Its 'plug and play' approach, ease of installation and the uniqueness of the concept has facilitated its rapid growth in recent years through the highly successful UIPM Global Laser Run City Tour.



WORLD SCHOOLS BIATHLON
(SWIM-RUN)

In 2005 UIPM launched a new competition linked to the success of Biathle. The event consists of Swimming (in a 25m or 50m pool) and Running (preferably on a standardized track although it can also be carried out on a flat surface if extra care is taken so that the distances are correct). Swimming takes place first and the Running begins with a mass start. The final result is the sum of the total points.

The success and originality of the World Schools Biathlon is that schools take part in this international competition by entering their results in a global database using the UIPM website (www.pentathlon.org) directly from their location.



MASTERS

(MODERN PENTATHLON)

Members of the UIPM Masters community take part regularly in competitions around the world, including the UIPM Masters World Championships, continental and multi-lateral gatherings.

By keeping in touch with Modern Pentathlon, the Masters athletes - many of them former elite pentathletes - contribute to the development of the sport while staying competition-fit and connected to their fellow veteran athletes.

There are two formats in Masters competitions, Modern Pentathlon and Tetrathlon, and many of the athletes also compete in categories from 40+ to 70+ in the UIPM World Championships in Laser Run and Biathlon-Triathlon.



PARA PENTATHLON

(inc. PARA LASER RUN)

The UIPM Para Sports movement began with the formation of a Para Pentathlon Working Group and through UIPM's membership of the International Paralympic Committee (IPC). Since then the movement has flourished, with many disabled athletes in numerous countries receiving support to practise Para Laser Run and other disciplines of Para Pentathlon.

UIPM has stated its ambition for Para Pentathlon to become part of the Paralympic Games in future, offering disabled athletes the same opportunity as able-bodied athletes to experience the ultimate test of mind and body. Many National Federations have demonstrated their commitment to inclusion by identifying athletes and finding pathways for them with the help of UIPM's support team.



UIPM HALL OF FAME

The UIPM Hall of Fame recognises athletes, administrators and others who have made a unique impact on

the core Olympic sport of Modern Pentathlon, starting with its founder, Baron Pierre de Coubertin.

PENTATHLON PARTNERSHIPS

UNIVERSITY SPORT

UIPM has a partnership with FISU, the governing body for university sport, which gives students around the world the opportunity to compete with one another at the FISU University World Modern Pentathlon Championships.

The first instalment of the competition took place in **Budapest (HUN)** in 2018, attracting high-quality pentathletes from 18 nations across five continents.

Egypt won a medal in all three categories, including a silver for **Ahmed Elgendy** (left). The gold medals were won by **France (Brice Loubet, Men's Individual)**, **Italy (Elena Micheli, Women's Individual)** and **Poland (Marta Gobecka and Lukasz Gutkowski, Mixed Relay)**.

MILITARY SPORT

Modern Pentathlon has always had strong connections to the military and many Olympic and world champions have been serving in the military, most famously General George Smith Patton (USA), who competed in Stockholm 1912.

UIPM has a strong relationship with CISM, the governing body for military sport, and many of the world's elite pentathletes take part in the CISM Military World Championships and CISM Military World Games. These are Category 1 Modern Pentathlon competitions and the last World Games took place in Wuhan (CHN) in 2019. The individual gold medalists were **Oktawia Nowacka of Poland** and **Alexander Lifanov of Russia**, and there were relay/team golds for **Egypt, Russia and China**.



MODERN PENTATHLON TIMELINE

Modern Pentathlon is a unique multi-discipline sport created by the founder of the modern Olympic movement, Baron Pierre de Coubertin, that combines mental and physical challenge to find the most complete athlete. It evolved from the Ancient Pentathlon and was introduced at the Stockholm 1912 Olympic Games. It

was Coubertin's belief that the event would "test a man's moral qualities as much as his physical resources and skills, producing thereby the ideal, complete athlete". Now gender-equal, the sport has evolved considerably, with modern concepts and technology improving the sport and the spectator experience.

HIGHLIGHTS, HEROES & RECORDS

1950s
MEN



UIPM was formed in 1948, during the London Olympics where Wille Grut (SWE) won gold to complete an unusual double (he also won silver in the 1948 Olympic Winter Games in Saint Moritz). Sweden continued to dominate, with several world titles and consecutive Olympic gold medals for Lars Hall in 1952 and 1956. Hall was the first pentathlete to win individual Olympic and world gold. But all the time athletes from the USSR, Konstantin Salnikov and especially Igor Novikov, were starting to get stronger...

1960s
MEN



Former Soviet Union (URSS) and Hungary were the dominant nations, winning all team gold medals at Olympic Games and World Championships. Igor Novikov, and then especially András Balczó (winning individual Olympic and several individual World Championships gold) from Hungary were the outstanding athletes, with Ferenc Török and Ferenc Nemeth winning Olympic gold as well.

1970s
MEN



After András Balczó was crowned as Olympic champion in 1972, he was succeeded by Janusz Peciak from Poland in 1976. He became the best athlete of this era, together with Pavel Lednev, four times individual world champion from the USSR. Poland was the only nation to break the USSR and Hungarian phalanx, by clinching several World Championships team titles. The only other athlete winning individual gold at a World Championships during this time was Bob Nieman from USA in 1979.

1980s
MEN



Whereas Poland (with Peciak and his teammates), Soviet Union (with Anatoli Starostin, World Championships and Olympic Champion) and Hungary (with a new, young team) kept winning, Italy became a strong nation, winning team gold in 1986, Olympic medals and individual World Championships titles with Daniele Masala and Carlo Massullo. By the end of the decade, all of the new Hungarian team comprised of Attila Mizser, László Fabian and János Martinek had won individual gold at either World Championships or Olympic Games and several team gold medals. Starostin, Peciak and Masala all won individual Olympic gold and individual World Championships gold.

WOMEN



In the early years of women's Modern Pentathlon the dominant athletes were Irina Kiseleva and Barbara Kotowska (USSR) and Dorota Idzi (POL). But Sabine Krapf (GER), Eva Fjellerup (DAN) and the British team, well represented by Wendy Norman, and the French started to compete strongly. The first Women's World Championships took place in 1981 (individual + relay). Great Britain had a golden generation with Kathy Taylor and Sarah Parker winning a lot of team events.

1990s
MEN



Poland had strong individual athletes with Arkadiusz Skrzypaszek winning individual gold at the Olympics (1992) and World Championships (1991). Besides Hungary, Poland and USSR being strong teams the French became a strong Pentathlon nation. It started with Joel Bouzou winning individual World Championships gold in 1987, followed by team gold in 1994, and finally Sebastian Deigne becoming a double individual world champion (1997/1998). The Russian athlete Dmitry Svatkovsky also won consecutive individual World Championships gold in 1994 and 1995.

WOMEN



Whereas Poland remained the dominant team and Italy was an emerging force, Eva Fjellerup from Denmark was the woman to catch as she won individual World Championships gold four times. Hungary, Germany, Italy, Russia and Belarus had very successful women athletes during this time as well.

2000s
MEN



Dmitry Svatkovsky completed his medal collection by winning individual Olympic gold in 2000 and leading a new Russian generation to several world titles. Andrey Moiseev became double Olympic champion (2004 and 2008). Besides established nations, new countries, such as Lithuania (Andrejus Zadneprovskis, Edvinas Krungolcas), Czech Republic (Michal Sedlecký) and also Germany (Eric Walther) had athletes winning World Championships and also Olympic medals. It was also the decade when Asian countries, led by South Korea and China, started to become strong contenders, especially with Zhenhua Qian winning individual World Championships gold in 2005.

WOMEN



Great Britain grew in strength, winning team and individual world titles and also gold and bronze at the first Olympic Games to feature women's pentathlon in 2000. Stephanie Cook (GBR), Zsuzsanna Vörös from Hungary and Lena Schoeneborn of Germany all won individual gold at World Championships and the Olympic Games. Amélie Caze from France enjoyed a remarkable period of dominance, winning the World Championships three times, while Schoeneborn (GER) became the youngest of the first three women's Olympic champions when she claimed gold in Beijing 2008 aged just 22.

2010s
MEN



At London 2012, David Svoboda emerged to take gold for the Czech Republic for the first time. Cao Zhongrong (silver) won China's first Olympic medal while 2009 world champion Adam Marosi (HUN) took bronze. In Rio de Janeiro four years later, Alexander Lesun (RUS) became champion after a strong and unflappable performance that gave no chance to the rest of the field. Pavlo Tymoshchenko (UKR) won silver and Ismael Hernandez Uscanga (MEX) won a sprint to the line for bronze.

WOMEN



Following the success of Schoeneborn (GER) in Beijing, Laura Asadauskaitė from Lithuania nailed the victory in London 2012 with Samantha Murray (GBR, silver) and Yane Marques (BRA, bronze) joining her on the podium. However, the 2008 and 2012 champions were both eliminated during Riding at Rio 2016 and Chloe Esposito (AUS) engineered a stunning triumph. She was joined on the podium by Elodie Clouvel (FRA, silver) and Oktawia Nowacka (POL, bronze).



THE LEGACY OF COUBERTIN

Not long after the dawn of the 20th century, a French visionary named Baron Pierre de Coubertin had the idea to create a new sport linked to the philosophy of Pentathlon at the ancient Olympic Games - especially for the Modern Olympic Games he had recently established.

The Modern Pentathlon soon became celebrated as the ultimate examination of mind and body in Olympic sport. Coubertin's concept was introduced to the world at the Olympic Summer Games Stockholm 1912, and to this day, the influence of Coubertin is visible and profound.

Right across the UIPM Sports movement, the values of our founder are conspicuous – honesty and fair play, tenacity and courage, honour and sportsmanship – and in 2018

UIPM decided to establish a special day that would mark and celebrate Coubertin's legacy each year.

The 1st Pierre de Coubertin Pentathlon Day was held on September 9, 2018. A special ceremony was arranged in Mexico City (MEX) during the UIPM Pentathlon World Championships and the party was extended to all corners of the world thanks to the #High5 social media campaign.

In 2019, #PentathlonDay again took place during the World Championships in Budapest (HUN), and in 2020 the celebration coincided with the inaugural UIPM #LaserAllStars virtual competition, maintaining an important memorial for the founding father of a global sporting movement.
